#### About the College

Maharaja's College (Government Autonomous), located in the rapidly growing city of Cochin, is an exceptional institution that offers higher education with a distinct character. It boasts a rich heritage and remarkable accomplishments in various domains, including the creation and dissemination of knowledge, fostering liberal and secular values, promoting inclusive growth and development, and empowering marginalized communities to attain upward social mobility. The college campus, sprawling across 25 acres, is conveniently accessible by road, rail, air, metro rail, and waterways. It is a picturesque and serene oasis amid the city's hustle and bustle, thanks to the lush greenery, shady trees, thick foliage and pristine water ponds that create a tranquil atmosphere.

The college had a humble inception as a Basic English school way back in 1845, established in the former princely state of Cochin with the primary objective of providing "instruction to the students that would enable them to converse with Englishmen without interpreters." However, over the years, the college has evolved significantly and gained recognition as a 'Centre of Excellence' by the Government of Kerala and as a 'College with Potential for Excellence' by the University Grants Commission (UGC). This growth has been gradual but consistent, and today, the college stands tall as a distinguished institution for higher education.

The original elementary school founded in 1845 underwent several transformations over time, eventually becoming a college in 1875 in response to the increasing demand for higher education in Cochin and neighbouring states of Travancore and British Malabar. Originally named 'The Ernakulam College' and affiliated to the University of Madras, it offered First Arts Courses and quickly rose to become one of the premier educational institutions in the Madras Presidency. Like other colonial institutions across the country, Maharaja's had British principals at the helm. These enlightened individuals played a critical role in popularizing English education in the state of Cochin. The first principal, Professor A.F. Sealy (1875-1892), described himself and his compatriots as "labourers in educational work" dedicated to "bringing light to one of the dark regions of Asia." Despite this, he acknowledged that their work was simply "a just repayment of an old debt of gratitude that the West owes to the East."

The Golden Jubilee Year (1925) proved memorable in more than one way. The college was permanently rechristened as Maharaja's College. It started offering Bachelor of Arts

programmes in a number of disciplines, thereby raising itself to the status of a first grade college, turned residential by building hostels and formed an Old Students' Association which must surely be one of the oldest in the country. The next decade would witness a spurt in the number of programmes offered, especially in sciences and the addition of a 15- acre playground, on the land donated by the aristocratic Thottekat family.

Following India's independence and the formation of the state of Kerala in 1956, Maharajas began to expand its postgraduate programs and prioritized inclusivity by admitting students from marginalized and disadvantaged social backgrounds. Throughout the 1970s and 80s, the college experienced a surge in enrolment and celebrated its grand centenary in 1975. The college has seen remarkable growth in the number of female students and teachers, and the gender ratio became skewed in favour of women during the 1990s. Additionally, the college responded to changing times by offering new, innovative programs like B.Sc. Instrumentation and B.Sc. Environment & Water Management in the 1990s.

In the new millennium, Maharaja's began to place greater emphasis on technology-enhanced teaching and learning by establishing state-of-the-art ICT facilities. The number of researchers also surged, and the college is now a Centre of Excellence with 19 teaching departments offering 20 undergraduate, 21 postgraduate, 1 integrated and 18 doctoral programmes. Undergraduate courses range from music and commerce to computer applications, showcasing the diversity of the college's academic offerings. The college has three hostels and a 15-acre playground with a synthetic track and pavilion. In 2010, the Department of Science and Technology (DST) selected all the science departments of the college for special assistance under the Fund for Improvement of S&T Infrastructure (FIST) programme. The college received A grade accreditation from the NAAC in both 2006 and 2013.

The college has been doing well in the Mahatma Gandhi University youth festival, bagging the first place or runner-up position consistently. Many of the winners have cut a niche for themselves in the fields of cinema, television or other media. In terms of achievements in academic evaluation, the college has managed to maintain the streak of success successively. The college got a shot in the arm with its inclusion in the Cluster of Colleges, a body exclusively formed to share the resources of a few select colleges in and around the city. Various activities were undertaken by the Cluster in the last few years. In 2014-15, the college was elevated to the status of an autonomous college. It is the first and the only government autonomous college in Kerala.

#### 2. Governing Body

Maharaja's College holds the prestigious distinction of being the only autonomous college in the government sector in the state. This esteemed institution has been autonomous since the year 2015, which has contributed significantly to its growth and development. As an autonomous college, Maharaja's operates with a certain degree of independence and has the authority to design and implement its own academic programs, curriculum, and evaluation systems. This empowerment enables the college to adapt its educational offerings to the changing needs of students and the evolving demands of the job market.

At the core of the autonomous structure lies the Governing Body (GB), which serves as the apex body of the college. The GB of Maharaja's College exercises its authority in key decision-making processes related to academic policies, infrastructure development, and overall institutional governance. - c) Approval of new programmess: The GB plays a vital role in expanding the academic offerings of Maharaja's College. It has the power to approve the introduction of new programs of study leading to degrees and/or diplomas. This allows the college to adapt to emerging disciplines, meet the evolving demands of students and the industry, and ensure a comprehensive educational experience.
- d) Approval of annual budget: As a key authority, the GB approves the annual budget of the college. In addition it evolves mechanisms to address issues related to the conduct of examinations.

The Finance Subcommittee plays a crucial role in managing the financial aspects of the college. It works towards formulating and reviewing the annual budget, monitoring financial resources, and ensuring that funds are allocated appropriately to support various academic and administrative needs. The Finance Subcommittee also evaluates financial proposals and provides recommendations to the GB for consideration.

#### 3. Academic Council

#### Minutes of the academic council on 10/03/2021

The Academic Council convened its meeting at 2:30 PM in the VIP lounge. Dr. Mathew George, the chairman and principal, commenced the proceedings by extending a warm welcome to all the members in attendance. He then handed over the floor to Dr. Krishnakumar K., the secretary, who presented the agenda and provided a thorough overview for further discussion.

#### Agenda Discussed:

1. Question paper pattern change of UG and PG Examinations as per the letter dated 27.01.2021 from the Registrar, Mahatma Gandhi University in the wake of to COVID 19 pandemic.

During the meeting, the secretary outlined both the current pattern and the proposed pattern of question papers. The council engaged in a detailed discussion on the matter and ultimately approved the new pattern of question papers. They decided to promptly inform the Controller of Examinations about the approved changes, ensuring their immediate implementation. It is important to note that this revised pattern of question papers will be applicable solely to the regular batches of the academic year 2020-21.

2. Approval of the Board of studies in Integrated PG Programme in Archaeology and Material cultural studies.

The Secretary presented the panel of members for the Board of Studies of newly sanctioned integrated programme in Archaeology and Material Cultural Studies. The nominated members were Dr. Vinodkumar Kallolickal (associate professor of history), Sri. Abdul Lathif C.H, (assistant professor of history), Prof. K. Krishnan (professor and dean, faculty of arts at M S University, Baroda), Dr. Ajithkumar, (DLRA-F, Kesavadasapuram, Thiruvananthapuram), Dr. Cyriac Jose (assistant professor of archaeology at St. Thomas College, Pala), Dr. Vinod V, (assistant professor of archaeology at Mar Thoma College for Women, Perumbavoor), Sri. Jenee Peter (assistant professor of history, UC College, Aluva), Dr. V.R. Shaji (conservation officer, Centre for Heritage Studies, Hill Palace, Thrippunithura), and Dr. B. Venugopal (honorary director, Centre for Intangible Heritage, SSUS, Kalady). The Council has also resolved to send a letter to the Registrar of Mahatma Gandhi University to assign the University nominee to the newly constituted Board of Studies.

3. Discussion and approval of the syllabus of the newly sanctioned Integrated Programme in Archaeology and Material Cultural Studies.

The Council was presented with a draft syllabus, which had been prepared by a committee of experts under the convenorship of the Secretary. After a thorough discussion, the Council

acknowledged that some minor modifications were necessary. Therefore, it was decided that the newly constituted Board of Studies would review the syllabus and propose the suggested modifications. The Chairman of the Council was entrusted with the responsibility of approving the final version of the syllabus after considering the Board's recommendations.

4. Change of valuation of the existing system to the new one proposed by the Controller of Examinations. The Controller of Examinations presented a proposal to the Chairman suggesting a modification to the current double valuation system, proposing a shift to 20% external evaluation and 80% internal valuation. The Council extensively deliberated on the advantages and disadvantages of the proposed change. After careful consideration, the Council resolved that it is in the best interest to maintain the existing double valuation system. Therefore, the decision was made to continue with the current assessment approach.

5. Question bank preparation (UG and PG) and Software enabled question paper generation as proposed by the Controller of Examinations.

The Secretary provided an update stating that a decision regarding this matter had already been made during the Academic Council meeting on October 1st, 2019. Furthermore, two workshops had been conducted as planned. However, due to the non-purchase of the necessary software, the implementation was delayed. To address this issue, the Council resolved to proceed with the purchase of the required software. Additionally, a committee was formed to prepare the question bank, with Dr. Rema L P, Head of the Department of Zoology, serving as the convenor. The other members of the committee included Sri. Abdul Lathif C. H, Head of the Department of History, Dr. Abdul Latheef Kozhipparamban, Head of the Department of Arabic, and Dr. Rekha Karim, Head of the Department of English.

#### 6. Conduct of Practical examination by internal examiners due to COVID 19 pandemic.

The Council reached a resolution stating that the practical examinations, project evaluations, and viva voce examinations for both undergraduate and postgraduate programs may be conducted by appointing internal examiners. It is important to note that this decision applies exclusively to the regular batches of the academic year 2020-21. However, it was emphasized that all other regulations and requirements for conducting these examinations should be strictly adhered to without any deviations.

#### 7. Reporting of the comments of the NAAC Peer team by IQAC coordinator.

The 1QAC coordinator, Sri. Santhosh T. Verghese, provided a summary of the comments made by the NAAC peer team during their visit on February 25th and 26th, 2021, specifically addressing curricular aspects. Taking these comments into consideration, the Council reached the following resolutions: a) The Council decided that the question papers for

both undergraduate (UG) and postgraduate (PG) programs must include evaluation questions related to Programme Outcomes. b) It was resolved that the examination calendar should incorporate the schedule for internal evaluation examinations. c) The Council emphasized that all Board of Studies should include at least one add-on course in the curriculum. These resolutions were made with the aim of incorporating the recommendations of the NAAC peer team and enhancing the overall quality and effectiveness of the academic programs.

#### 8. PG Syllabus revision

The existing PG Syllabus should be revised based on the Outcome Based Education for 2021 admission.

#### Minutes of the Academic Council on 09/06/2021

The Academic Council convened its meeting at 3:00 PM in an online mode, necessitated by the COVID-19 pandemic. Dr. Mathew George, the chairman and principal, commenced the proceedings by extending a warm welcome to all the members in attendance. He then proceeded to present the agenda for the meeting. Representing the Chairman, Dr. Krishnakumar K., the Secretary, provided a detailed overview of the agenda and invited the members to engage in a discussion on the presented topics.

#### Agenda Discussed.

#### 1. Approval of the Academic Calendar 2021-22.

The secretary of the council presented the Academic Calendar for the year 2021-22, which was developed by a committee with great attention to detail. The primary objective of the calendar was to ensure that the semester did not overlap with the vacation period and that the duration of the academic programs remained unchanged. After a thorough discussion, the council members made some modifications to the calendar. Specifically, they decided to shift the commencement of the second semester for both undergraduate (2020 admission) and postgraduate (2020 admission) students from July 9, 2021, to August 2, 2021. Subsequent semesters were adjusted accordingly. These modifications were implemented to better align the academic schedule with the council's requirements. Once the modifications were agreed upon, the council approved the revised Academic Calendar.

#### 2. Conduct of End semester examination and valuation due the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Council reached a resolution to approve the establishment of off-campus examination centres in various districts. The responsibility of organizing these centres, based on the candidates' needs, was entrusted to the Controller of Examinations. Owing to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Council resolved to modify the existing double valuation system for end semester examinations. Under the new system, only 20% of the answer books would be

randomly selected for external valuation. As a result of this change, students would be allowed to apply for revaluation in accordance with the existing rules of Mahatma Gandhi University. It is important to note that this altered valuation system is applicable only to the current semesters and has been implemented in response to the pandemic. For the sixth semester of undergraduate programs and the fourth semester of postgraduate programs, the Council decided to conduct project evaluations and viva voce examinations internally via online mode. It was mandated that a minimum of two examiners, in addition to the Head of the concerned department, must be present on the examination board.

#### 3. Award of bonus mark to the students graduated from Maharaja's college for PG admission.

The Council convened to discuss the proposal of granting bonus marks to students who graduated from Maharaja's College during the admission process for postgraduate programs. After a comprehensive discussion, the Council concluded that the implementation of this practice was neither practical nor in line with the existing policies followed by autonomous colleges. Recognizing the need for further guidance and a thorough assessment of the feasibility of such an initiative, the Council suggested reaching out to the Autonomous Approval Committee or the University. This approach would help determine whether the implementation of bonus marks for Maharaja's College graduates could be considered and, if so, the appropriate steps to take. Therefore, the Council resolved not to implement the bonus mark system at the present time and instead proposed exploring the matter with the relevant authorities for clarification and potential approval.

- **4.** The Board of Studies for Economics (Honours) and Political Science presented a proposal to the Chairman suggesting a modification in the calculation method of the index mark for undergraduate admissions. After thorough deliberation, the Council reached a resolution to approve the proposed change. It was decided that the Council would approach the University to seek the necessary orders for implementing the revised calculation method of the index mark.
- 5. The Convenor of the Admission (2021-22) Committee submitted a proposal to the Chairman, which included recommendations for the enhancement of admission fees, reduction in the number of options in the application from 5 to 3, appointment of a technical committee for certificate verification, and the inclusion of arts and sports quota in the application process. The Council deliberated on the proposal and resolved that the option for admission should be maintained at 5, as stated in the existing prospectus. However, the other matters mentioned in the proposal were determined to be outside the purview of the Council. Additionally, on the request of the Secretary, Dr. Rema L.P., the Convenor of the question bank preparation Committee, provided a progress report on the preparation of the question bank during the meeting.

#### Minutes of the Academic Council on 06/10/2021

The Academic Council convened its meeting at 3:30 PM in an online mode, considering the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Dr. Mathew George, the Chairman and Principal, commenced the proceedings by extending a warm welcome to all the members in attendance. He then proceeded to present the agenda for the meeting. Representing the Chairman, Dr. Krishnakumar K., Associate Professor and the Secretary, provided a comprehensive overview of the agenda on behalf of the Chairman and invited the members to engage in a discussion on the presented topics.

#### Agenda discussed

#### 1. Examination related matters informed by the Controller of Examinations.

a. The Council discussed the pattern of the question paper for the 5<sup>th</sup> semester (2019 admission) and the supplementary examination. It was resolved that the liberalized pattern implemented in the 4th semester would also be followed for the 5<sup>th</sup> semester examination. This decision was made in consideration of the online classes conducted due to the COVID-19 pandemic. However, for the supplementary examination, the Council decided to revert to the old pattern (non-COVID-19 pattern).

#### b. Conduct of external evaluation

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Council implemented a system where only 20% of the answer scripts were subjected to external evaluation. After thorough deliberation, the Council resolved to continue with the present system but with the introduction of a centralized valuation camp. However, considering the strong arguments put forth during the discussion, the Council decided to form a committee to thoroughly study the advantages and disadvantages of both the 100% and 20% external valuation systems. This committee would be responsible for preparing a comprehensive report on the matter to be submitted to the Chairman of the Council. The committee consists of Dr. Suresh V N (Head of the Department of Commerce), Dr. N. Shaji (External Member), and Dr. Bloomy Joseph (Head of the Department of Mathematics).

#### c. Conduct of practical examinations

Owing to the COVID-19 pandemic, the practical, viva voce, and project evaluations for both undergraduate (UG) and postgraduate (PG) programs were conducted solely by internal examiners. However, the Council reached a resolution stating that starting from November 1st, 2021, the practical, viva voce, and project assessments would be evaluated by a combination of one external examiner and one internal examiner. This decision was made to enhance the evaluation process and ensure a comprehensive and unbiased assessment of the students' performance.

- 2. The Chairpersons of the board of studies for chemistry and zoology presented a proposal to the council regarding a change in the distribution of weightage in practical examinations. After careful consideration and deliberation, the council unanimously resolved to approve the proposed change. The specific details of the revised weightage distribution were not provided, but it can be understood that the modifications were deemed appropriate and beneficial by the council members. The revised weightage distribution will likely enhance the assessment process in practical examinations for both Chemistry and Zoology subjects. With the council's approval, the change in weightage distribution will be implemented, reflecting the council's commitment to continually improve and adapt the evaluation methods in the academic curriculum.
- 3. Admission criteria of music: approved, to be communicated to Mahatma Gandhi University for ratification.
- 4. Preparation of the comprehensive academic calendar: the academic calendar for the academic year 2021-22 was approved in the council meeting conducted on 09.06.2021. However, based on the suggestion of the NAAC peer team, the council resolved to prepare a comprehensive academic calendar which includes the dates of in-semester examinations as well as the tentative dates of publication of result of each examinations. The calendar has to be prepared under the convenership of 1QAC Coordinator. Member Secretary, Controller of Examinations, Academic Monitoring Committee as well as the present Committee involved in the preparation of College Calendar are other members.
- 5. As permitted by the chair the Council resolved to represent the grievance of the totally blind students for giving additional grace marks to the End Semester examinations after obtaining consent from the University.

#### Minutes of the Academic Council on 04/02/2022

The academic council began its meeting at 7.30pm in online mode due to COVID-19 pandemic. The honourable Chairman Dr. Pooja P. Balasundaram, teacher-in-charge of the principal, welcomed the members. The secretary Dr. Krishnakunar K., the secretary, presented the agenda in detail on behalf of the Chairman and opened for discussion.

#### Agenda Discussed

- 1. Examination related matters informed by the Controller of Examinations.
- a. On the basis of a letter from Mahatma Gandhi University, it has been decided in a meeting held on 06/10/2021 that a liberalized pattern of question papers will be implemented for the 5th semester undergraduate (UG) examinations, with the exception of supplementary examinations. The meeting participants discussed and resolved to follow this liberalized pattern of question papers for the academic year 2021-22, in accordance with the directives of Mahatma Gandhi University.

- b. Conduct of practical examinations, project viva and comprehensive viva voce examinations during the academic year 2021-22 due to COVID 19 pandemic. It was discussed in detail and resolved the following:
- 1. Both UG and PG practical examinations and project viva has to be conducted by at least two internal examiners.
- 2. The project viva of both UG and PG can be conducted online.
- 3. For PG projects a two stage evaluation may be followed for the fruitful completion of the project, and for comprehensive viva one external examiner to be in the board in addition to one internal examiner.
- 4. Plagiarism checking has to be adopted as a desirable practice in the PG projects.
- c. Issues of provisional degree certificate and migration certificate.

As per the communication from Mahatma Gandhi University (Order No. 6020/Ac B7/202 I/MGU dated 12.11.2021) autonomous colleges were authorized to issue provisional degree certificate and migration certificate to students. It was resolved that these certificates can be issued to the students from 2021-22 academic year by the Controller of Examinations on fulfilling other stipulations.

d. Modification of the MC PGP-CSS 2019 regulation for the conduct of comprehensive vivavoce. As per the order No. 4054/AC A9/202 1/M1GU dated 17.08.2021 of Mahatma Gandhi University modified the PG CSS Regulation 2019. It was discussed and the following amendments were incorporated in the MC PGPCSS-2019 regulations.

# 2. Presentation of the report of the Reforms in the regulations of valuation of answer scripts of end semester examinations of UG and PG examinations.

A committee was constituted under the chairmanship of Dr. Suresh. V.N, HoD Commerce in the Academic Council meeting on 06.10.2021. The submitted report was exhaustively discussed and resolved the following:

- 1. 100% internal evaluation and 20% of the answer scripts undergone internal evaluation are to be randomly selected and to be subjected for external evaluation.
- 2. The chief valuation is to be continued. The HoDs should ensure the effective and timely chief evaluation.
- 3. If the difference in marks/weightage obtained (in  $1^{st}$  and  $2^{nd}$  valuation) is more than 20% of the maximum marks/weightage, then such answer scripts should be valued further by a different internal examiner. The average of the  $3^{rd}$  valuation and nearest to (scored in  $1^{st}$  or  $2^{nd}$  valuation) will be the final marks/weightage.
- 4. If 50% or more of the externally valued answer scripts of any course shows 20% variation in marks/weightage, the marks/weightage of the courses to be disclosed (only after 3<sup>rd</sup> valuation of all answer scripts by an internal examiner) to the HoD concerned by the Controller of Examinations (CE) for its appraisal. If the mistake was from the external examiner, the matter is to be informed to the CE; if by the internal examiner proper warning to be given by the HoD. The details of external examiner should not be disclosed under any circumstances.
- 5. The Council also suggested a periodical appraisal of the evaluation by a team of external examiners.
- 6. The present revaluation system is to be followed.

#### 3. Modification of Syllabus of B.A English proposed by the Department of English.

The Board of Studies in English have recommended marginal changes in the modules and hour distribution for the 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th semesters of the B.A. English program on 11.11.2021. These recommendations were approved and it was further recommended to communicate them to Mahatma Gandhi University.

# 4. Approval of the Syllabus of the Integrated Programme in Archaeology and Material Cultural Studies.

The Board of Studies in Archaeology and Material Cultural Studies finalized the syllabus on 18.01.2022 and requested to approve the same. It was discussed and resolved to approve and forward the same to Mahatma Gandhi University. The secretary suggested to obtain clarifications from University regarding the exit provision from the course on completion of 3 years as well as the regulations regarding Integrated Programme.

#### 5. Inclusion of the Internship in the PG programme

A previous decision had already been made to introduce an internship in the PG Programme starting from the 2022 admissions. It was resolved that each student should complete a minimum of 10 days of internship before the conclusion of the 4<sup>th</sup> semester. In order to implement this, the MC PGP-CSS Regulations 2019 will be amended accordingly.

#### Minutes of the Academic Council on 21/04/2022

The academic council began its meeting at 3.00pm via online mode. The honourable chairman Dr. V. Anil., Principal, welcomed the members and presented the agenda. The secretary Dr. Krishnakumar K. presented the agenda in detail on behalf of the chairman and opened for discussion.

#### Agenda Discussed.

1. Approval of the PG Regulation and revised Syllabi of the PG programmes (2022 admission onwards).

As per the decision of the Academic Council on 10.03.2021 the Board of Studies (BoS) of Arabic, botany, chemistry, commerce, English, economics, history, Hindi. Islamic History, mathematics, Malayalam, music, physics, political science, philosophy, Sanskrit, statistics, zoology and geology revised their Syllabi and presented it before the Academic Council. The Secretary informed that one of the external member, Prof. (Dr.) K G. Poulose, has an inconvenience in attending the meeting hence his suggestions will be communicated to the Council via email, also announced that the Chairman of the BoS concerned should note the suggestions of the external members as it was purely related to the Programme concerned and incorporate the same accordingly. The council exhaustively discussed each restructured syllabus. The Chairman of each BoS presented the revised Syllabus. While on discussion the following suggestions were made by the external members. Prof. (Dr.) Jayachandran, School of Biosciences, MG University suggested the inclusion of rubrics in the implementation of outcome based education (OBE). The Secretary assured that it would be discussed in the next Council after a thorough discussion with the internal members. Dr. N. Shaji suggested the feasibility of provision for common course for different programmes; he strongly discouraged the inclusion of astrology in the Syllabus of Sanskrit; he also suggested the inclusion of western music in Music Syllabus. Prof. (Dr) Beena Mathew, School of Chemical Sciences, suggested some modifications in the electrochemistry. Dr. Ajithkumar suggested the modifications in the syllabi of economics and statistics. After a thorough discussion the Council resolved to approve and recommended the PG Regulation and Syllabi of various PG Programmes mentioned above.

Dr. Shinas PA and Dr. N. Shaji have suggested the setting of question papers by the internal faculty. The secretary informed to the Council that this shall be implemented during the question bank preparation in connection with the conduct of End semester examinations.

The Chainman as well as the Secretary informed to the Council that the restructured Syllabus of the Geology programme was not followed certain components of the OBE hence require a modification, thus the Council resolved that the BoS should follow the OBE and shall incorporate the same and the Chairman of the Council is entrusted to approve the syllabus after the modification suggested by the Council.

#### 2. Approval of the Academic Calendar 2022-23.

The Secretary presented the Academic Calendar 2022-23 which was communicated to all members. Dr. Angel Mathew of statistics informed that the UG and PG would not be able to start on June 2022. Dr. Sunilkumar S. Menon of economics and Dr. Suresh V. N. of commerce also expressed the same concern as well as suggested to extend certain semesters for completing the syllabi. Dr. Bloonny Joseph of mathematics suggested that the calendar is not realistic because the syllabus would not be completed especially for the running IV semester of PG. She also requested the Chairman of the Council to reduce some portions of the syllabi. The Secretary informed the Council that the Academic Calendar was prepared in such a way that the vacation days were excluded. The Chairman given a detailed narration on every matter presented, also informed that minor changes may be permitted for commencement of 1 UG and I PG 2022 admission. This will be taken only after the 2022 admission. The Council resolved to approve the Academic Calendar of 2022-23.

#### 3. Correction in the Prospectus of 2022 UG/PG admission.

The BoS of Islamic History and History submitted a letter to the Chairman that certain errors were noted in the prospectus. Hence it is resolved to modify as follows and effective in the 2022 admission.

#### 4. Research Advisory Committee

Research plays a critical role in the growth and development of an autonomous college in the Indian context, and for that matter everywhere. In today's competitive environment, research serves as a tool to enhance the academic and research profile of an institution. Through research, an autonomous college can generate new knowledge, develop innovative ideas, and enhance the quality of its teaching and learning practices. In India, research is vital for promoting economic growth, societal development, and solving pressing issues such as poverty, inequality, and environmental challenges. Moreover, research provides opportunities for students to engage in critical thinking, problem-solving, and creativity, preparing them for future careers and contributing to the nation's intellectual capital. Therefore, research is an essential component of an autonomous college in India, contributing to the institution's growth, development, and impact on society.

A Research Orientation Programme refers to a systematic examination of the foundations, quality, and outcomes of faculty members' and research scholars' work. Such a program is crucial for guiding and educating researchers towards a professional research-oriented practice. By participating in such a program, researchers can hone their skills and become experts capable of identifying, refining, and redefining problems, as well as assessing and analysing complex situations. This approach fosters an environment of critical thinking and ensures that research is conducted at the highest level of quality, ultimately leading to more impactful outcomes. The aim of this programme is to help faculty members and research scholars in understanding the intricacies of writing a paper, improving citations and getting it published in quality journals. It also focus on how to find the funding agencies and experts with time and effort saving.

With the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic and subsequent lockdowns, educational boards mandated that colleges transition to online classes. In response, the Research Committee at Maharaja's College conducted a series of webinars as part of their 2021 Research Orientation Programme. This initiative was taken to ensure that research scholars and faculty members were equipped with the necessary skills to conduct research in an online environment. By hosting these webinars, the committee aimed to create a platform for knowledge exchange and to foster a culture of research and innovation even in the midst of challenging circumstances.

The following sessions were conducted as part of research orientation programme.

a) Dr. Sitanshu Sekhar Das, an esteemed Assistant Professor at Rajagiri Business School in Kochi, was invited to deliver a series of lectures on Open Access Publishing, publishing misconduct, and research metrics as part of the Course Work Webinar Series organized by the Research Committee of Maharaja's College, Ernakulam. The first lecture was held

- on 8th June 2021 from 2:30 PM to 4:00 PM through Google Meet, with the topic focusing on Open Access Publishing. The second lecture, which centered on Open Access Publishing and publishing misconduct, was delivered on 9th June 2021 from 2:30 PM to 4:00 PM through Google Meet as well. Finally, Dr. Das gave a lecture on research metrics on 10th June 2021 from 2:30 PM to 4:00 PM, which was also held via Google Meet. The insightful lectures were well-received by the attendees and provided valuable knowledge and insights into the world of research and publishing.
- b) Dr. Reinhart Philip, Assistant Professor in the Department of International Relations & Politics at the Central University of Kerala, Kasaragod, delivered three insightful lectures via Google Meet in June and July 2021. On 28th June (Monday), from 02:30 PM to 04:00 PM, Dr. Philip spoke on philosophy and research, providing valuable insights on the subject. On 2nd July (Friday), from 03:00 PM to 04:30 PM, he delivered a lecture on the scientific conduct of research, where he discussed the importance of maintaining ethical standards in research. On 5th July (Monday), from 03:00 PM to 04:30 PM, he gave a talk on ethics in research, providing valuable insights on ethical issues in research. - c) Dr. Vneeth K M, Assistant Professor of commerce at Government College, Tripunithura, delivered two lectures via Google Meet in September 2021. On 7th September (Tuesday), from 7:30 PM to 9:00 PM, Dr. Vneeth K M spoke on citation and referencing using Zotero, providing valuable insights on the subject. On 8th September (Wednesday), from 7:30 PM to 9:00 PM, he delivered a lecture on plagiarism checking and paraphrasing, where he discussed the importance of maintaining academic integrity and avoiding plagiarism in research. These lectures provided an excellent opportunity for students and researchers to learn from Dr. Vneeth K M's vast knowledge and expertise in the field of citation and referencing, as well as academic integrity.
- d) Mr. Shihab I., librarian in the Department of Islamic Studies at the University of Kerala, Thiruvananthapuram, was invited to deliver two lectures on Open Educational Resources (OER) for learning, teaching, and research. The first lecture took place on November 13th, 2021, from 10:30 AM to 12:00 PM, and was conducted via Google Meet at meet.google.com/das-ncto-pdp. The second lecture, which was part II of the series,

- was held on November 27th, 2021, from 10:30 AM to 12:00 PM, also through Google Meet at meet.google.com/soz-nhxv-jdg. Both lectures were informative and provided valuable insights on the use of OER in education and research.
- e) Mr. Jasimudeen, Senior Library Manager, St. Stephens College, Uzhavoor, delivered an invited lecture on trends in academic plagiarism as part of the Course Work Webinar Series on 21.11.2021 from 2.30 PM to 4.00 PM, through Google Meet [meet.google.com/imq-uyun-rgf].
- f) In addition to the programmes mentioned above, the researchers of the college conducted a series of seminars. They covered topics such as plagiarism, data fabrication, and research misconduct, and provided guidelines on how to conduct research with integrity. The sessions on research methodology addressed the fundamental principles of research design, data collection, and data analysis. The seminars were conducted by experts in their respective fields, who provided valuable insights and practical advice to the scholars. The scholars actively participated in the seminars and had the opportunity to ask questions and clarify doubts. On balance, these seminars were a valuable addition to the University's academic program and helped to promote ethical and rigorous research practices among its scholars.

#### 5. Admissions

#### Undergraduate programmes

In response to the outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic, the admission process for undergraduate programs was shifted to online mode for the safety and convenience of the applicants. The online registration process for these programs commenced on July 30, 2021, and was open until August 10, 2021. This move to an online admission process was implemented to facilitate a smooth and hassle-free application process, while also ensuring the safety of the applicants, faculty, and staff.

We are pleased to announce that we have received a staggering 40,351 applications for the 21 undergraduate programs. The applications received were for various programs, with the maximum number of 4,784 applications received for B.A. English (English Language and Literature, Model I). This high number of applications for B.A. English reflects the popularity and demand for this program among the student community. On the other hand, the program with the least number of applications was B.A. Music, for which we received a total of 129 applications.

We are excited and grateful for the overwhelming response to our undergraduate programs, and we thank all the applicants for their interest in our institution. The admission committee will now begin the process of screening the applications and shortlisting candidates for the next round of the admission process. We wish all the applicants the very best of luck and look forward to welcoming the new batch of students to our institution.

Following the closure of the online registration process on August 10, 2021, the admission committee of our institution began the process of shortlisting candidates for the next stages of the admission process. On August 16, 2021, a draft index was published, which included the list of candidates who had qualified for the next stage of the admission process. This draft index was published on the official website of our institution and was made available to all the applicants.

The Department of Music also conducted an aptitude test for the applicants who had applied for admission to the department. This aptitude test was conducted on August 17, 2021, and was aimed at assessing the applicants' skills and knowledge in music. The test was conducted online, and the applicants were required to appear for the test from their homes or any other convenient location. The results of the aptitude test were announced shortly after its completion, and the shortlisted candidates were informed about the next stage of the admission process.

On August 24, 2021, the rank list for the sports/ arts/ DA category was published on the official website of our institution. This list included the names of the candidates who had applied under the sports/ arts/ DA category and had qualified for the next stage of the admission process. The candidates in these categories were selected based on their performance in the relevant areas and were given admission to the various undergraduate programs on August 31, 2021.

We are pleased to announce that the admission process for our undergraduate programs has been going smoothly, and we have received a tremendous response from the applicants. The admission committee is working diligently to ensure that the admission process is fair, transparent, and efficient. We wish all the candidates the very best of luck and look forward to welcoming the new batch of students to our institution.

Following the completion of the aptitude test and the shortlisting of candidates for the various categories, the admission committee of our institution published the provisional rank list and the sure list for the first allotment on August 31, 2021. The list was published on the official website of our institution and was made available to all the candidates who had applied for admission to our undergraduate programs.

After the publication of the rank list, the applicants were required to verify their relevant documents online. This was done to ensure that all the documents submitted during the online registration process were authentic and valid. After the verification process was completed, the candidates were allowed to make online fee payments between September 8, 2021, and September 9, 2021. This was a crucial step in the admission process, and the candidates were advised to make the fee payment within the stipulated time to secure their admission.

The dates for reporting at the college for the submission of original documents and other payments were between September 10, 2021, and September 15, 2021. The candidates

were required to report to the college on the specified dates to submit their original documents and make the necessary payments. It was mandatory for the candidates to complete this step to secure their admission to the undergraduate program of their choice.

Finally, the classes for the academic year 2021-22 commenced on October 11, 2021. The students who had completed the admission process and had secured their admission to the undergraduate programs were required to attend the classes from this day. The faculty and staff of our institution welcomed the new batch of students and wished them all the best for their academic journey.

We are pleased to announce that the admission process for our undergraduate programs has been completed successfully, and we have admitted a talented and diverse group of students to our institution. We wish all the students the very best of luck for their academic pursuits and look forward to seeing them excel in their chosen fields.

#### Postgraduate programmes

In line with the Covid-19 pandemic guidelines and to ensure a seamless admission process, our institution decided to conduct the admission process for the postgraduate programs online. The online registration for various PG programs started on August 17, 2021, and the last date for online registration was September 13, 2021. We received a total of 7,176 applicants for various PG courses, indicating a healthy interest in our institution.

The draft index for the postgraduate programs was published on September 15, 2021. Following this, the sports/arts/DA rank list was published on September 22, 2021. On September 16, 2021, an aptitude test was conducted for admission to the Department of Music. The admission committee then published the provisional rank list and the sure list for the first allotment on September 22, 2021. The list was published on the official website of our institution, and the candidates who secured admission were required to upload all the relevant documents by September 26, 2021.

The heads of all departments verified all the documents uploaded by the students before September 29, 2021. This was done to ensure that all the documents submitted were authentic and valid. Once the verification process was completed, the students were allowed to make the fee payment from September 30, 2021, onwards.

Finally, the classes for the postgraduate programs commenced on October 25, 2021. The students who had completed the admission process and had secured their admission to the postgraduate programs were required to attend the classes from this day. The faculty and staff of our institution welcomed the new batch of students and wished them all the best for their academic journey.

We are proud to have completed the admission process for our postgraduate programs successfully, and we have admitted a talented and diverse group of students to our institution.

We wish all the students the very best of luck for their academic pursuits and look forward to seeing them excel in their chosen fields.

#### 6. Controller of Examinations

The examination wing encountered numerous challenges throughout the academic year 2021-22, similar to the previous year, due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. While the uncertainties caused by the lockdowns had diminished, the examination-related tasks had not returned to normalcy. Many pending examination works from the previous academic year extended into the current year, further complicating the already disrupted working schedules of the Controller of Examinations Office.

The education sector swiftly adapted to the new circumstances by embracing technology. Various curricular activities such as teaching, learning, internal assessment, viva voce, and even admission procedures successfully transitioned to online platforms. However, the adoption of technology for conducting examinations and evaluations posed challenges due to their specific nature. As a result, these tasks had to be carried out in the traditional manner.

Furthermore, several modifications were implemented in the conduct of examinations and evaluations. The practice of employing modified, yet more flexible, question paper patterns continued to benefit undergraduate (UG) and postgraduate (PG) students. This approach aimed to address any potential shortcomings arising from online classes.

As an autonomous college completes each academic year, the workload of the examination wing naturally increases. This is due to managing additional regulations, multiple batches of students, an increased number of mark lists, and other databases. However, during the academic year 2021-22, the Office of the Controller of Examinations faced an extraordinarily high volume of work, primarily due to the aforementioned circumstances.

#### Revised Regulations

The regulations governing the postgraduate (PG) programs were initially revised in 2016, a year after the college attained autonomous status. Consequently, PG students admitted in the years 2016, 2017, and 2018 were subject to the revised regulations. From the 2019 PG admissions onwards, the second syllabus was implemented, transitioning to an outcome-based education approach. Under the revised regulations, a direct grading system was introduced across all PG programs. Similarly, the undergraduate (UG) regulations underwent their first revision in 2016. As a result, UG students admitted in the years 2016, 2017, 2018, and 2019 were

governed by the revised regulations. The UG regulations were revised for a second time, taking effect from the 2020 admissions and onward, fully embracing the outcome-based education model. During this academic year, the examination cell faced the challenge of managing examinations under three different sets of regulations, including supplementary examinations. Each new regulation placed additional responsibilities on the Office of the Controller of Examinations.

#### Examination Schedule

In previous years, the examination cell would diligently create the examination schedule in alignment with the college's academic calendar well in advance of the academic year. This schedule was then presented to the Academic Council and Governing Body for approval. However, the unprecedented uncertainties brought about by the pandemic and subsequent lockdowns hindered the ability to prepare a comprehensive examination schedule in advance during the academic year. Despite this challenge, notifications for all examinations during the designated period were promptly published well in advance to ensure the convenience of the candidates.

#### Board of Question Paper Setters

For each semester examination, boards of question paper setters were established, comprising members selected from the lists provided by the respective Boards of Studies. Separate boards were formed for the postgraduate (PG) and undergraduate (UG) programs. The primary responsibilities of these boards were to create outcome-based question papers for each course, along with their corresponding answer keys or valuation schemes. The boards ensured that the question papers adhered to the prescribed standards and covered the syllabus as designated.

To facilitate this process, the external question paper setters received the relevant syllabus, a model question paper, and the approved question pattern blueprint for each course well in advance. Based on these materials, the external question paper setters prepared three sets of question papers, along with their respective answer keys or valuation schemes, ensuring timely delivery. This undertaking demanded meticulous efforts, significant time investment, and extensive correspondence, all while maintaining strict confidentiality.

Scrutiny Board

#### Scrutiny of question papers

The scrutiny of each course's question paper was conducted by a scrutiny board, which consisted of the chairman and a senior member from the board of question paper setters. The primary objective of the scrutiny board was to ensure that the question paper aligns with the prescribed syllabus, contains no errors, maintains consistent standards across optional questions, and reflects the appropriate level of difficulty in line with the course outcomes. Once the scrutiny process was completed, the chairman personally handed over all the question papers, along with their corresponding answer keys, to the Controller. These question papers were securely sealed and properly labelled in separate envelopes to maintain confidentiality and integrity.

#### **Question Paper Selection**

The Controller personally selected the actual question paper for each course's examination by randomly picking one from the three sets of scrutinized question papers. Subsequently, the Controller assigned random question paper codes to each selected question paper. Before the final printing, the draft question papers underwent another round of careful scrutiny by the Controller. The printing, packing, and labelling of all the question papers were carried out with utmost caution, prioritizing security and maintaining strict confidentiality. The Controller directly supervised these processes to ensure the integrity and confidentiality of the question papers. The entire procedure demanded meticulous attention to detail, diligence, and a commitment to maintaining confidentiality throughout.

#### **Question Paper Pattern**

To address any potential shortcomings of the newly introduced online classes, a relaxed pattern of question papers was implemented specifically for regular students attending online classes. The existing question papers, which were initially prepared following the traditional pattern, had to be modified to incorporate additional internal optional questions in each paper. This modification aimed to benefit the students by providing them with more options to choose from within the question papers. However, it is important to note that the regular pattern of question papers had to be maintained for candidates appearing in supplementary examinations. This additional task of modifying question papers to accommodate the relaxed pattern for regular students while adhering to the usual pattern for supplementary candidates posed significant challenges for the Office of the Controller of Examinations. The office had to navigate this difficult task while ensuring the smooth conduct of examinations for all students.

#### **Examination Timetables**

The notification and timetable of various end semester examinations were published one month prior to the commencement of the examinations. Adequate time was given to the candidates to register and pay the examination fee every time. The notification was published in the college website every time. The notifications were shared through social media in order to ensure that each candidate gets the information immediately.

#### SAY examinations

The SAY (Save a Year) examinations for all courses of semester V and semester VI of all UG programmes is conducted for the final year UG regular students after the publication of results of semester VI. Those regular students who have passed all the courses of the first four semesters are eligible to apply for the SAY examinations. The results were published immediately, taking special efforts, so that the passing students can apply for PG programmes without losing a year waiting for the next supplementary examinations.

#### 'Mercy Chance' Examination

As per the regulation, UG candidates of 2015 admission and PG Candidates of 2015 and 2016 admission can no longer appear for supplementary examinations. However, as decided by the Governing Body special examinations called 'Mercy Chance' were conducted for all courses of all semesters of all UG and PG programmes for the above candidates. This was the very first time, Maharajas College conducted the Mercy Chance examination, after becoming autonomous.

Applications for the examination had to be accepted offline. Additional question papers had to be set for the previous regulations. Due to meticulous planning and execution, the entire examinations could be completed in around eight weeks from 16.03.2022 to 12.05.2022. Results of the examinations were also published in a time bound manner.

#### **Examination Registration**

Examination registration and fee payment were fully online for regular students during the academic year. As per the extant government orders and other rules and regulations fee concession was given to the eligible candidates. Authenticated hall tickets for the eligible candidates were generated from the examination management software and made available to the candidates.

#### <u>Attendance</u>

Although all the programme regulations have made 75% attendance mandatory for appearing for the examinations, this requirement was relaxed this year too in view of the government orders and in view of the online classes.

#### Additional Chief Superintendent

The Principal is the Chief Superintendent of all examinations conducted in the college. An Additional Chief Superintendent was also appointed for all UG and PG examinations conducted during the academic year 2021-22. The Additional Chief Superintendent carried out the important task of conducting the examinations as per the timetable, availing the services of required number of the faculty as invigilators. Preparation of class rooms marking register numbers, preparing seating plan, distribution of the examination materials and answer scripts on each day of examination, receiving back the answer scripts, preparation of mandatory forms, packing the answer scripts, etc are some of the other functions of the Additional Chief Superintendent. The services of the non-teaching staff are also availed for the orderly conduct of the examinations.

#### Assigning False Number on Answer Scripts

On receipt of answer script bundles from the Additional Chief Superintendent, the answer scripts and once again counted manually to mark the absentees. Then these are sorted course wise and programme wise in order prepare it for valuation. Thereafter, portion of each of the answer sheets where the students write their register number are teared off, and a false number is assigned on each and every answer script in order to hide the identity of the

candidate. This is a time consuming task requiring extreme care and diligence. Barcodes based on false numbers were generated separately for each course of UG and PG programmes.

#### Board of Examiners

During the previous years, the double valuation system had been followed for valuation of each answer scripts of end semester examinations for all UG and PG programmes. However, due to the prevalence of the pandemic, the College Academic Council decided that only twenty percent of the answer script for each course need to be subjected to the external valuation.

The Boards of Examination consisting of internal and external examiners were constituted from the panels received from the Board of Studies of each programme. Separate boards were constituted for practical examinations and viva voce.

#### Valuation of Answer Scripts

The college follows double valuation of answer scripts of end semester examinations of UG and PG programmes. This year also, the valuation was conducted by both internal examiners as well as external examiners immediately after the examination; the first valuation was carried out by the internal examiner and the second by the external examiner. The valuation is based on meticulously prepared schemes of valuation. In view of the pandemic spread, the practice of centralized valuation camps was dispensed with and the internal examiners were allowed to take the answer scripts home for valuation. External valuation of answer scripts was conducted either in centralized valuation camps or by home valuation.

If there is a difference of the marks awarded in internal and external valuation, the average of the two is taken as the final mark. If the variation in marks of internal and external valuation exceeds 20%, such answer scripts are sent to a senior internal or external examiner for a third valuation, after assigning another false number. In such cases, the final mark will be calculated as the average of the mark awarded in the third valuation and the one nearest to it from the two earlier valuations.

#### **Practical Examinations**

Practical examinations were conducted soon after the theory examinations as per the time table set by the departments concerned. The Controller of Examinations appointed the external examiners from the panel submitted by the departments. Timetable for conducting practical examinations were also communicated to the candidates well before the examinations.

#### Project Evaluation & Viva Voce

In view of the limitations due to the coronavirus pandemic, the requirement of the evaluation of project reports by external examiners was dispensed with for both final year UG and PG programmes. Similarly, the requirement of external examiners for the comprehensive viva voce for final year PG programmes was also done away with. However, these evaluations were carried out by internal examiners in a timely manner.

#### Tabulation of Marks

The process of calculating the final marks from the different valuations is automated through examination software. The internal assessment marks of all semesters were uploaded by the tutors of each class. The results as well as analysis of the final results of each semester were printed for the consideration of the Pass Boards concerned.

#### Pass Boards

The Pass Board of each department consists of the chairman and two senior examiners who have valued the answer scripts. Separate pass boards for each semester were constituted, and convened its meeting immediately after the tabulation of marks is completed. Result statistics of each course were presented before the Pass Board for consideration and approval. The minutes of the Pass Board duly signed by the members have been kept at the CE office.

Pass Board for VI Semester UG and IV Semester PG examinations were conducted. The results of VI Semester UG and IV Semester PG examinations were published by the Governing Council. Publication of Results

After the approval of the results by the respective Pass Boards, the results were published by the Governing Council of the college. The results of all end semester examinations of all UG and PG programmes were published on time without any grievance. Computerized grade cards were issued semester wise immediately after the publication of results.

Grace marks were awarded to applicants for their achievements in Sports, Arts, NCC and NSS. It was awarded strictly as per the regulations of Mahatma Gandhi University.

# <u>Tabulation Register</u>

After the publication of the results of the final year UG and PG students, their marks of all semesters ae consolidated and the final mark list was prepared, incorporating the changes on account of improvement examinations, supplementary examinations and award of grace marks. This year the mark lists of both UG and PG were generated and printed using the examination management software. A lot of effort had to be taken to complete the process without any error.

Along with the issuance of the final mark sheets, a consolidated tabulation register had to be prepared for both UG and PG and sent to the Mahatma Gandhi University who issues the final degree certificates to the candidates. This was also a tedious task to complete within a time limit ensuring error free output.

# Mark List and Position Certificate

The mark list of final semester regular students as well as previous students who passed the programme in supplementary examinations were printed and distributed to the candidates in a very efficient manner. The students could use the mark list on time for various purposes

including further studies. Requests from various agencies for verification of the contents of the mark lists issued were also completed immediately for the benefits of the students.

In addition to the mark lists, rank position certificates to top 10 students of every programme were issued on application basis.

# <u>Provisional Degree Certificate</u>

As the University entrusted that task of issuing the provisional degree certificates to autonomous colleges, the CE office faced another new additional challenge in the academic year. The task was undertaken by the CE office amidst the other increasing works, and was completed successfully. This facility helped students to get their provisional certificate earlier, easily and without going to the university.

#### Grievances

Students were allowed to apply for Recounting, Challenge Valuation and viewing the photocopy of the answer scripts on payment of the required fee within 14 days from the publication of results. Those who failed in internal assessment can apply to redo the internal assessment with their junior batch after paying the prescribed fee. Table No. 7 gives the number of applications received under each category of grievance redressal.

# Continuous Internal Assessment System

The evaluation scheme for each course contains two parts; (a) in-semester evaluation and (b) end-semester evaluation. In-semester evaluation is out of 20 marks and end-semester evaluation is out of 80 marks. Regarding in-semester evaluation, each course will be assessed on the basis of different criteria such as attendance, tests, assignment and seminar.

Two internal assessment examinations were conducted in each semester out of 40 marks. Question papers were set by the respective faculty in charge of each course. At the end of each semester, course specific internal assessment marks (Form A) and consolidated internal assessment marks (Form B) were generated department wise.

To ensure transparency of the evaluation process, the in-semester marks awarded to the students in each course in a semester were published on the notice board at least one week before the commencement of external examination. There is not any chance for improvement for in-semester evaluation marks.

# Conduct of Supplementary/Improvement Examinations

Supplementary/Improvement examinations were also conducted along with Regular Semester end examinations and their results were also published along with results of regular examinations. Improvement examinations are allowed only for semester I, II, III and IV of UG programmes only. The students can appear for improvement examinations only once for each course, during the next year after their regular examination. However, UG students can appear for supplementary examinations till the lapse of three years from their sixth semester regular examinations. PG students can appear for supplementary examinations till the lapse of two years from their fourth semester regular examinations.

The Controller is supported by office staff including the Head Accountant, clerks, system administrator, data entry operators and office assistants. The examination system is computerized with a web-based exam management software developed and maintained by National Informatics Centre (NIC). The software is regularly being updated and streamlined to suit the increased requirements and also to cover more examination related activities. The software include, among others, the modules for examination scheduling and management, candidate management, registration, fee payment, hall ticket generation, mark entry and management, results, mark list generation, etc.

Examination Cell is well equipped with computer systems, heavy duty printers and UPS backup. It functions in a separate building in the campus with CCTV surveillance, office infrastructure, printing room, store room, distribution room and three valuation halls. However, infrastructure facilities including office space have to be enhanced in accordance with the increasing work load of the office.

# Facing Covid-19

The scale of the covid-19 crisis and the disruptions it caused was an enormous challenge to the examination wing. The uncertainties and anxieties the pandemic created among the academic community was difficult to overcome. Being the largest stakeholders, the students were the most affected. The college as well as the examination wing adopted several modifications and changes in the evaluation system in order to overcome these difficulties.

All examinations halls in the college were sanitized and are equipped with hand sanitisers. The invigilators were given gloves. Temperature of all students are taken on all days of examination at college gates. In order to minimize contact with hands, the signatures of students were not taken on the forms used in the examination halls. Number of candidates in each hall was reduced for ensuring physical distancing among candidates. This process increased the number of examination halls and the number of invigilators. Special examination halls were set up for those candidates with covid-19 symptoms. The answer scripts were kept in quarantine in such cases, before valuation.

Internal assessment examinations, viva voce and project evaluation were conducted online. To mitigate any possible shortcomings of online classes, modified but relaxed question paper patterns were adopted benefitting the both UG and PG students. The requirement of 75% attendance for appearing for the examination was dispensed with.

Earlier, the valuation of the answer scripts by internal examiners used to be done in centralized camps. But in view of the pandemic, the internal examiners were allowed to take the answer scripts for valuation at home and return. The external evaluation was limited to 20% of the answer scripts only in view of the pandemic. Students were given the chance for revaluation of the answer sheets, in the place of the prevailing challenge valuation system.

The office of the controller of examinations is functions fully following the covid-19 protocols. An electric sanitizer dispenser is installed at the entrance. Hand sanitizers are made available in all rooms. All staff of the office follow the prescribed covid-19 protocols strictly, and are fully vaccinated. The office staff continue to offer their dedicated service even amidst the anxieties and uncertainties of the pandemic and lockdowns.





# **CAMPUS CLEANING**






#### **FEBRUARY 9, 2022**




3. National Science Day Celebration

#### 10. Tutorial Committee

The Tutorial Committee for the academic year 2021-2022 was constituted by the Principal of Maharajas College in Ernakulam. The decision was approved by the Staff Council, and Dr. Surya Aravindakshan, an Associate Professor from the Department of Political Science, was appointed as the Convenor of the Committee. Other members of the Committee included Dr. Divya T, an Assistant Professor from the History department, Dr. Sindu K S, an Assistant Professor from the Music department, Salahuddin K, an Assistant Professor from the Arabic department, and Gishamol Mathew, an Assistant Professor from the Physics department. Due to the pandemic, the 2021-2022 academic year was heavily affected, with most classes being conducted online. To provide necessary help to students and overcome any academic issues that may have arisen due to the pandemic, the Tutorial Committee implemented a weekly tutorial program. This program was held during the last hour of every Wednesday, and teachers were assigned to closely interact with their designated students during this time. This allowed students to receive personalized attention and guidance from their teachers. The Tutorial Committee frequently monitored the activities of each teacher and collected feedback from

students to ensure that the program was running smoothly and effectively. As a result, the tutorial program was highly successful, and after the restarting of offline classes, it was conducted even more fruitfully. The program proved to be a valuable resource for students, as it allowed them to receive the extra help they needed to succeed in their studies despite the challenging circumstances posed by the pandemic. Overall, the Tutorial Committee of 2021-2022 played an important role in supporting the academic success of students at Maharajas College in Ernakulam, especially during a difficult year. The commitment and dedication of the committee members, along with their focus on meeting the needs of students, ensured the success of the tutorial program and helped students to overcome the challenges posed by the pandemic.

#### 11. Internal Examination Committee

The Internal examination committee consisted of Convenor and one representative from all the departments except Physical Education. Committee met as and when needed, offline and sometimes online too. The first cycle of internal examinations for the academic year was scheduled following the online meeting of academic council to finalize the academic calendar 2021-22, on 02/06/2021. It was decided to conduct the First internal examination of II Semester UG and II Semester PG on any convenient dates between 10/6/2021 and 18/6/2021. It was also decided that the examinations can be conducted during the periods of respective teachers, or even outside the class hours, if students are willing. Department coordinators were informed to mail the mark lists of the internal examination to the Convener on or before 25/6/2021. A meeting convened on 25/6/2021, decided to conduct the Second internal examination of II Semester UG and II Semester PG on any convenient dates between 10/7/2021 and 18/7/2021. Examinations can be conducted during the periods of respective teachers. It can also be outside the class hours, if students are willing. Department coordinators were informed to mail the mark lists of the internal examination to the Convener on or before 25/7/2021. Notice was given on 12/9/2021, to all departments to schedule the First internal examination of V sem UG at their convenience before 25th of September. Consolidated mark lists should reach the coordinator before 30th of September, without fail. On 28/10/2021 notice was issued to all departments to conduct the second internal of V sem UG from 10/11/2021 to 16/11/2021.and to mail the Mark lists to the convenor on or before 20/11/2021. Intimation was given on 08/11/2021 as follows: In the backdrop of the indefinite strike called for by private bus operators, v sem internal exams are postponed and that the dates will be informed later. However, since bus strike was withdrawn, it was further informed that internal exams can be conducted as scheduled earlier.

First internal examinations of III sem UG and PG was conducted from 3/12/2021 to 10/12/2021. Malayalam and Sanskrit exam was scheduled on 9/12/2021. English exam was conducted by the parent depts, on the same day, same time.

For the serious and systematic conduct of I internal exams of iii sem ug, the time table is scheduled as follows: 6/12...complementary I, 7/12...complementary II, 8/12...Core, 9/12...Second language, 10/12...English ..Time is 9.45 to 11.15 on all days. It was decided that all exams must be conducted by the parent department itself. However, change in schedule was brought about as per council decision... and time table was 6/12/21 -10 to 11.30 complementary I, 1.30 to 3.00- complementary II, 7/12- 10to 11.30-core, 9/12- 10 to 11.30 Addl. Lang, 1.30 to 3.00- English

First internal examination of I sem UG and PG was conducted in the first week of January 2022.

An online meeting of all members is scheduled at 10 am 27/12/2021. It was decided that for the internal exams already conducted, the retest can be given on the basis of a request letter from student signed by tutor and recommended by HoD of the student. Coming exam onwards, students must be made aware that retest will be entertained only on genuine grounds.... and the format of request will be made available by then. All depts must conduct the second internal exams of i ug and pg on days from 25/02/22 to 04/03/22 and submit the mark lists before 10/02/22. Time and dates of PG examination can be scheduled as per depts convenience. For the conduct of exams of language, departments were entrusted to fix their schedule, ideally during own periods. All examinations were over by 5th March. For the conduct of all the above examinations financial assistance for question paper printing was done by PTA.

### 12. Sports and Games

The college takes immense pride in its sports teams and athletes who have demonstrated remarkable excellence at various levels of competition. During the 2021-22 academic year, the Department of Physical Education spearheaded an effort to provide rigorous training through coaching camps, enabling our students to participate in a range of sports and games hosted by institutions like Mahatma Gandhi University. #### c) Youth festivals

### iii. Botany

#### **Curricular Aspects**

During the academic year 2021-2022, classes resumed following the COVID-19 pandemic. To accommodate more students in the light of the pandemic which had crippled the mobility of students aspiring to pursue higher education in distant destinations, the number of postgraduate seats was increased from the usual ten to twenty. The academic calendar was published and classes and examinations were conducted as per the schedule. In addition to the regular curriculum, a hands-on Taxonomy training program was organized on December 18th, 2021, to benefit M.Sc. botany students. Furthermore, online classes on R programming were conducted to enhance the students' understanding of the subject, which is highly relevant for research purposes.

#### **Extra-Curricular Activities**

As suggested by several faculty members of the department, the Botany Association was started. The Association, under the leadership of Dr. Kavitha R, has been making significant strides towards promoting the field of botany and raising funds for charity. One of their recent initiatives was the Kanivu Juice Fest, which was held on 05/03/2022. The event was a huge success, and the association was able to raise a substantial amount of money for charity. In addition to the Kanivu Juice Fest, the Botany Association also organized a Taxonomy Training Workshop, which was designed to help botany students and enthusiasts deepen their understanding of plant classification and identification. This workshop was well-attended and received positive feedback from participants.

The Botany Association also organized a webinar on Prospects for Botany Education and Research during the Post Covid period. This webinar brought together experts in the field of botany to discuss the impact of the pandemic on botany education and research, and to explore new opportunities for growth and development in the field. In short, the Botany Association has been playing a crucial role in promoting botany and raising awareness about the importance of plant science. Their efforts to organize events and workshops, as well as their

## iv. Chemistry

The postgraduate and research department of chemistry has a rich and proud history dating back to 1935. It has since grown to become one of the largest departments among colleges in Kerala. Currently, the department boasts a total student population of 312, which includes 188 undergraduate students, 109 postgraduate students, and 15 research scholars. #### **MOUs**

On February 6th, 2021, the department of polymer science and rubber technology at CUSAT signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the department of chemistry for a three-year partnership. #### Syllabus revision

In 2021, we undertook a comprehensive revision of the syllabus for its postgraduate courses, including MSc Chemistry, MSc Analytical Chemistry, MSc Pharmaceutical Chemistry, and MSc Applied Chemistry. The department aimed to incorporate an Outcome-based Curriculum (OBC) that would align the courses' learning outcomes with the needs of industry and academia. After rigorous planning and consultation with subject matter experts and stakeholders, the revised curriculum was finalized, which included a range of core and elective subjects that emphasized practical skills, critical thinking, and research aptitude. The new curriculum was implemented on June 1st, 2022, with the program codes MRCHEPG, MRANCPG, MRAPCPG, and MRPHCPG, under the program name PG (CSS). The revised syllabus and OBC framework have been well received by students and faculty alike, as they provide a more comprehensive and practical approach to learning, preparing students for future employment and higher education opportunities.

## vi. Economics

The department of economics has a rich history, dating back to its establishment in 1875. It has since grown to become one of the largest departments in the college in terms of student enrollment. The department's commitment to excellence is reflected in its journey from offering a BA in Economics in 1921 to becoming a postgraduate department in 1951. The department's dedication to research has led to its upgrade as a research center under Mahatma Gandhi University in 2002. The department continues to evolve, offering innovative programs that meet the needs of students and the economy. In 2014, it introduced a BA Honors in Economics program, making it the only department in the state to offer an undergraduate honors program in economics. Today, the department remains at the forefront of economic research and education, preparing its students to become leaders in the field.

The department of economics had a successful academic year in 2021-22, despite the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic. Throughout the year, both academic and non-academic activities were conducted smoothly. To adapt to the situation, the department utilized online platforms to deliver lectures and engage in academic activities until September 2021. Starting from October 2021, the department resumed offline classes. The faculty members and students embraced this transition, and actively participated in all activities of the department. In BA Model 1, Ms. Krishnapriya scored 90.01% marks and topped the program. In the academic year 2021-22, the department saw two more scholars being awarded the prestigious Ph.D. degree, bringing the total number of Ph.D. holders to 22. The department is immensely proud of its research supervisors, who have played a crucial role in guiding and mentoring these scholars to achieve their academic goals. Currently, the department has a team of six experienced and knowledgeable research supervisors, out of which three are retired professors who continue to provide their valuable guidance and support to the department. The department is fortunate to have such a distinguished team of supervisors, who bring with them a wealth of knowledge and experience in the field of economics. At present, the department has a total of 11 scholars pursuing their research, with eight scholars engaged in part-time research. The department is committed to providing these scholars with a nurturing and supportive research environment, where they can pursue their academic goals with utmost dedication and focus. Moving forward, the department remains committed to promoting research excellence and innovation in the field of economics. It will continue to support its scholars in their research endeavors and will strive to foster a culture of intellectual curiosity and academic rigor within the department.

## vii. English

The Department of English was established in 1875, coinciding with the birth of Maharaja's College. The college has grown steadily from a second-grade institution affiliated with the University of Madras to a Centre of Excellence over the course of nearly 150 years. Similarly, the department has evolved admirably, initially catering to the needs of various undergraduate programs and the First Arts Course (later renamed the 'Pre-University Course'). In 1956, the department introduced a postgraduate program in English, making it one of the first institutions in Kerala to offer the esteemed master's degree in the subject. Sixteen years later, in 1972, the department expanded its offerings to include an undergraduate program. Following the golden jubilee of its postgraduate program in 2007, the department was elevated to the status of a research centre, granting Ph.D. degrees. Currently, the department comprises 16 teaching faculty members, eleven of whom hold Ph.D.s and actively engage in research in various capacities. Others are either in the process of submitting their theses or have already done so. Notably, the department plays a unique role in reaching all undergraduate students, as English is a mandatory subject at that level. Members of the department have consistently contributed to the overall growth and performance of the college by serving in central bodies such as the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) committees. Additionally, there are nine supervisors, including retired and external teachers, and more than twenty research scholars currently associated with the department. Over the past five years, the department has produced nine Ph.D. graduates and has seen 35 students successfully clear the National Eligibility Test, seven of whom received Junior Research Fellowships. These achievements bear testimony to the department's commitment to excellence in higher education and research.

#### Result analysis of VI semester B.A.

The beginning of the even semester of the academic year was marked by ambiguity, as there were uncertainties regarding the mode of teaching. However, there was also a renewed enthusiasm among students to attend offline classes at college, which proved helpful in overcoming the lack of motivation caused by the long-lasting COVID pandemic. The opportunity for interaction among students in the classroom and with faculty was invaluable, contributing to a shift in outlook and an increased zeal for life as students adapted to unforeseen changes in their lives. The positive energy of the students was evident in their participation and enthusiasm for both curricular and extracurricular events. The pandemic also led to a technological turn in pedagogy, which had several advantages. Classes were conducted in blended mode, as needed, which helped to promote educational engagement among the students. On balance we feel that while the uncertainty surrounding the mode of teaching was challenging, the renewed vigour for life and the benefits of blended learning were some of the positive outcomes of the pandemic.

The sixth semester began in December 2021, but due to the COVID wave and various student events, the first internals were postponed until 8.3.22. Despite the delay, a good majority of students performed well in the internals, with only five students needing to take the re-test. All students received individual feedback on their answer scripts. The constructive feedback provided after the first internal exam proved to be fruitful, as almost all students scored around 90% in the second internal examination conducted on 12.4.22. The dedication and hard work of the students are reflected in their excellent scores. Unfortunately, one student from Lakshadweep was absent throughout the semester. We hope that the student is safe and well and will be able to catch up with the rest of the class soon.

In the sixth semester of the B.A. program, students were required to complete six courses, with a dissertation/project being a significant component. Throughout the semester, students were given assignments in each course, which were evaluated by the respective teachers. Remedial classes were held on a timely basis to ensure that students received the necessary support and guidance to excel in their coursework. The mentoring sessions proved to be immensely useful, providing students with individual attention from their guides. These efforts were reflected in the final BA projects submitted by the students. The external examiners appreciated the project reports and were impressed with the students' efforts during the project viva. Out of the 24 students who had registered, 23 appeared for the examination, and the pass percentage was an outstanding 100%. Five students received S grade, eleven received A+, two each received A and B+, while three received B grades. These excellent results are a testament to the hard work and dedication of both the students and the faculty.

In the course on Women's Literature, 24 students appeared for the examination and the pass percentage was 88. 5 students received S, 9 received A+, 3 received A, 0 received B+, 2 received B, and 1 each received C and D grades. The same pass percentage was reported in the course on Comparative Literature. 10 students received A+, 5 received A, 1 received B+, 3 received B, and 1 each received C and D grades. The course on Commonwealth literature saw a greater pass percentage of 91. Out of the 24 registered students only 23 could attend the exam. 2 students received S, 6 students received A+, 5 students received A, 7 students received B+, and 1 student received B grade. In the remaining two

courses the pass percentage was 92. In the course on Indian literature in English, 2 students received S, 7 students received A+, 6 got A, 2 each got B+ and B, and 3 students received C grades. In the elective course on Dalit Literature, 5 students got A+, 8 received A, 4 received B+, 2 got B, and 3 received C grades. The average pass percentage for the sixth semester was 91.83.

The anxiety of being in the final year of the undergraduate programme was dealt in the mentoring sessions. Consultation was provided for the preparation of the Post-graduate admissions. This was, especially done by integrating the 3-year programme into the mentoring sessions. The overall performance by the students was above average. The result analysis shows the resolution of both the teachers and the students in moving towards a proper sense of education in both overcoming the limitations caused by the Pandemic and preparing for a better future.

## Result analysis of fourth semester M.A.

The fourth semester of the MA English program comprised five core courses and a project evaluation with an external viva as a crucial part of the curriculum. Out of the 24 students who appeared for the examination, the results were outstanding, with all students passing and a pass percentage of 100%. Six students secured an A+ grade, while 12 secured an A grade, and three secured a B+ grade. Sreelakshmi P.S. achieved the highest score, securing a CGPA of 4.66. The success was not limited to the overall results, as the students also excelled in individual courses.

In the Visual Culture course, students performed exceptionally well, with 10 securing an A+ grade, nine securing an A grade, and four securing a B+ grade. Only one student received a B grade. The An Introduction to Dalit Writing course also saw impressive performances, with one student securing an A+ grade, 18 securing an A grade, and four securing a B+ grade. One student secured a B grade. In the Translation Studies course, two students secured an A+ grade, while nine students secured an A grade. Two students secured a B+ grade, and one student received a B grade. In the Popular Culture course, four students achieved an A+ grade, 15 secured an A grade, three secured a B+ grade, and one student received a C+ grade. The course Understanding Cinema: Film Theory also saw good performances, with two students securing an A+ grade, 12 students securing an A grade, seven students securing a B+ grade, two students securing a B grade, and one student receiving a C+ grade. In the project and viva-voce, most of the students performed exceptionally well, showcasing novel ideas and producing works that were relevant to contemporary times. Seven students achieved an A+ grade, while eight students secured an A grade, and seven students achieved a B+ grade. Two students received a B grade. The department was pleased with the overall performance of the batch, although two students had to drop out due to personal reasons, and one student could not write the final semester exam due to personal inconvenience. The department will provide all possible assistance to the student who failed in the final exams.

## viii. Geology

The Department of Geology offers MSc program and has been actively engaged in various initiatives aimed at promoting geology among the younger generation and nurturing a passion for Earth Science. As part of the revised syllabus, which is designed based on program-specific outcomes, the second-semester geology students embarked on a field study program from October 13th, 2022, to October 15th, 2022. The field study covered the areas of Kollam and Varkala in the Thiruvananthapuram district. Additionally, the students had the opportunity to visit the Indian Rare Earths Limited (IREL) in Kollam and the National Centre for Earth Science Studies (NCESS) in Thiruvananthapuram during their field study.

Recognizing its excellence, the Government of Kerala has officially declared the department as a Centre of Excellence. This acknowledgment speaks to the department's dedication to providing high-quality education and research opportunities in the field of Hindi language and literature. The department offers a comprehensive range of academic programs, catering to students at different levels of study. At the undergraduate level, students can enrol in the Hindi program, which provides a strong foundation in the language, literature, and cultural aspects associated with Hindi. The postgraduate program further enhances students' knowledge and skills in Hindi, allowing them to delve deeper into advanced topics and areas of specialization. Additionally, the department offers a doctoral program, enabling scholars to pursue in-depth research and contribute to the expanding body of knowledge in the field.

The curriculum of the department is carefully designed to ensure a holistic learning experience. It encompasses a balanced blend of theoretical and practical components, equipping students with a comprehensive understanding of Hindi language, literature, and related disciplines. The faculty members, renowned experts in their respective areas, employ innovative teaching methodologies and facilitate engaging discussions to foster a stimulating academic environment. The department actively promotes research and encourages students and faculty members to undertake research projects in diverse areas of Hindi language and literature. This emphasis on research cultivates a culture of intellectual inquiry and scholarly exploration, contributing to the overall academic growth of both students and faculty members. The research outputs from the department have made valuable contributions to the field, and its scholars regularly participate in national and international conferences, seminars, and publications.

Moreover, the department serves as a hub for Hindi language and literature enthusiasts, organizing various cultural events, workshops, and seminars to promote the rich heritage and linguistic diversity associated with Hindi. These activities not only enhance the students' cultural awareness but also foster a sense of community and camaraderie among the Hindi scholars.

During the academic year 2021-2022, the Department of Hindi witnessed a significant number of students enrolled in various programs. A total of 122 students pursued their undergraduate studies in Hindi, showcasing the popularity and demand for the program. Additionally, 30 students were enrolled in the postgraduate program, further highlighting the department's commitment to providing advanced education in Hindi language and literature. Furthermore, it is noteworthy that a substantial number of students from other departments, approximately 425 in total, selected Hindi as an additional language. This demonstrates the widespread interest and recognition of Hindi as a valuable linguistic skill in various academic disciplines.

In order to adapt to the evolving educational landscape, the department took the initiative to restructure the syllabus for the Bachelor of Arts (BA) Hindi program. The revised syllabus was implemented on November 27th, 2019, and has been in effect for undergraduate admissions starting from the year 2020. This restructuring aimed to ensure a comprehensive and contemporary curriculum that aligns with the changing needs and demands of the field, providing students with a well-rounded education in Hindi language, literature, and related subjects. In contrast, the Master of Arts (MA) Hindi syllabus remains unchanged, emphasizing the importance of a strong foundational knowledge and

advanced study in the discipline. This consistency in the MA syllabus allows students to delve deeper into the intricacies of Hindi language and literature, facilitating specialized research and advanced scholarship.

By constantly refining and updating the syllabi, the department ensures that students receive the most relevant and up-to-date education in Hindi studies. This proactive approach not only enhances the learning experience for students but also equips them with the necessary skills and knowledge to excel in their chosen career paths. The department's commitment to maintaining an inclusive and comprehensive Hindi language program, as reflected in the enrolment statistics and syllabus restructuring, highlights its dedication to promoting Hindi language and literature education and meeting the evolving needs of students in the field.

During the initial period until November 2021, classes in were conducted online due to the prevailing circumstances. However, from November onwards, the department adopted a hybrid mode of instruction, combining both online and offline methods. This approach allowed for greater flexibility and ensured that students could benefit from a blended learning experience. To assess the progress and performance of the students, the department organized two test papers and seminars for both postgraduate (PG) and undergraduate (UG) programs as part of the internal assessment. These assessments were conducted using online as well as offline platforms to accommodate the varying needs and preferences of the students. Students submitted their answer sheets and assignments via Google Classroom during online classes, while hard copies were collected from them subsequently.

To further evaluate the practical aspects of the curriculum, the department conducted internal and external project viva for both PG and UG students. These platforms provided an opportunity for students to showcase their knowledge, research, and presentation skills, allowing them to gain practical exposure and receive valuable feedback from faculty members.

During the revision period, the department implemented various remedial measures aimed at enhancing the academic performance of both PG and UG students. These measures could include additional tutorials, mentoring, guidance sessions, and supplementary study materials. The objective was to provide students with the necessary support and resources to improve their understanding and achieve better results. Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) meetings were conducted for each class, fostering a constructive dialogue between the faculty members and parents. These meetings provided a platform to discuss the progress, challenges, and feedback regarding the students' performance and the course itself. Such interactions facilitated a collaborative approach towards students' academic growth.

The Department of Hindi organizes a range of programs each year to foster research activities and promote the Hindi language and literature. One such significant event is the celebration of Premchand Jayanti held annually. This event commemorates the birth anniversary of the renowned Hindi writer, Munshi Premchand. The department takes pride in organizing this celebration, which serves as a platform to honor the literary contributions of Munshi Premchand and raise awareness about his works. For this year's Premchand Jayanti Samaroh, Dr. Lalimol Varghese served as the coordinator, ensuring the smooth execution of the event. The department invited Dr. Santhi Nair, an eminent Hindi professor, as the resource person. Dr. Nair's expertise and insights enriched the event, providing valuable perspectives on Premchand's literary legacy.

In addition to the Premchand Jayanti celebration, the department also organized the Hindi Day celebration. Due to the prevailing circumstances, this event was conducted online, allowing participants

to join remotely. The Hindi Day celebration serves as an occasion to commemorate the importance of Hindi as a language and to showcase its cultural significance. Through various activities such as speeches, recitations, and cultural performances, the event aimed to foster a deeper appreciation for Hindi language and literature among the participants.

These programs organized by the Department of Hindi demonstrate its commitment to promoting research activities, honoring renowned Hindi writers, and celebrating the linguistic and cultural richness of the Hindi language. The active involvement of faculty members, coordinators, and resource persons enhances the quality and impact of these events, contributing to the overall academic and cultural growth of the department and its students.

## X. History

#### Result analysis of B.A.

The result analysis of the B.A. program for the sixth semester examination held in April 2022 reveals the following outcomes. A total of 44 students registered and appeared for the examination. Out of these, 28 students successfully passed the examination, comprising 3 boys and 25 girls. On the other hand, 16 students did not pass, including 6 boys and 10 girls. Among the students who passed, the distribution of grades is as follows: 1 student achieved the highest grade of A+, 11 students received grade A, 10 students earned grade B+, 4 students obtained grade B, 1 student secured grade C, and 1 student received grade F. Anupama P.L. emerged as the topper in the B.A. History program for the year 2022. She obtained an impressive total of 2782 marks out of a maximum of 3100. Her Cumulative Course Performance Average (CCPA) stands at an outstanding 8.99. This result analysis highlights the achievement of the students in the B.A. program, with a significant number successfully passing the examination. The presence of high-performing students, such as Anupama P.L., who secured top marks, reflects the dedication and academic excellence of the students.

#### Result analysis of M.A.

The result analysis of the M.A. History program for the fourth semester examination conducted in April 2022 reveals the following statistics. A total of 18 students registered and appeared for the examination. Out of these, 9 students successfully passed, consisting of 2 boys and 7 girls. On the other hand, 7 students did not pass the examination, including 2 boys and 5 girls. Among the students who passed, the distribution of grades is as follows: 1 student achieved the highest grade of A+, 3 students received grade A, 3 students earned grade B+, and 2 students obtained grade B. Shireen emerged as the topper in the M.A. History program for the year 2022. She achieved an impressive Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of 4.69. This result analysis highlights the performance of the students in the M.A.

#### Student progression and placement

Many students have chosen to pursue postgraduate courses within the institution itself or in other reputed colleges and universities. This showcases their trust and confidence in the academic environment and resources offered by Maharaja's College. Furthermore, a significant number of students have opted for professional courses such as MSW (Master of Social Work), B.Ed. (Bachelor of Education), and postgraduate Diploma in journalism in prestigious educational institutions. This

highlights the interdisciplinary approach and flexibility of the education system, enabling students to explore diverse fields and enhance their career prospects. The success of the students is evident through their placements in both Kerala State Government Service and private institutions. This reflects the high-quality education and practical skills imparted by the college, making the students well-equipped to excel in their respective fields. The placements in government service positions serve as a testament to the students' competence and the recognition of their capabilities by the state authorities.

#### <u>Programmes conducted by the department</u>

#### 1. Monthly Debate and Lecture Series

This tragic incident held significant historical importance, and the event aimed to pay tribute to the lives lost during this unfortunate event. Similarly, on February 5, 1922, another event was organized to commemorate the centenary of the Chauri Chaura incident. This event played a crucial role in India's struggle for independence, and its commemoration served as a reminder of the sacrifices made by freedom fighters.

Additionally, on December 13, 1971, an event was held to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Bangladesh War Victory and Goa Liberation. This event celebrated the significant milestones in the history of these regions, acknowledging the efforts and sacrifices made during these crucial times.

To enrich the commemorative events, the distinguished historian, Dr. M. Gangadharan, delivered a special commemorative talk on February 14, 2022. His expertise and insights provided valuable perspectives on historical events, further deepening the students' understanding and appreciation of history. As part of this commemorative lecture, Shafnap.s, a first-year M.A History student, had the honour of delivering a speech, showcasing the academic prowess and research capabilities of the students.

These events organized by the Department aimed to create a platform for students to engage with history in a meaningful and interactive manner. By commemorating significant historical events, students were able to develop a deeper connection to their country's past and gain a comprehensive understanding of its historical significance.

#### 5. Quality initiatives for students

## xi. Islamic History

The Department of Islamic History was established in 1971 with the introduction of the B.A. in the discipline. Professor C. Umar served as the founder head of the department. This program offered a unique blend of Islamic History, History, and Political Science, enabling students to explore the diverse social science aspects from an Islamic perspective. Islamic History delves into the political, social, economic, and historical developments of the Islamic civilization, encompassing various fields such as philosophy, political science, economics, gender studies, and sociology. This interdisciplinary nature sets Islamic History apart from other social science subjects, making it highly distinct and exceptional.

In 1980, the department was upgraded to a postgraduate department, allowing students to pursue advanced studies in Islamic History. Over the years, the department has made significant contributions by producing numerous teachers, civil servants, researchers, journalists, and politicians who have served the nation with distinction. Recognizing its scholarly achievements and research contributions, the department was elevated to a Research Centre affiliated with M.G. University, Kottayam in 2019.

Currently, the department offers undergraduate (B.A.), postgraduate (M.A.), and doctoral (Ph.D.) programs in Islamic History, following the Choice Based Credit Semester System (CBCSS). This system provides students with flexibility and a wide range of course options to tailor their academic journey according to their interests and career aspirations. The department continues to uphold its commitment to academic excellence and research, nurturing students' passion for Islamic History and empowering them with a comprehensive understanding of the subject. Through its comprehensive curriculum, distinguished faculty, and research-focused approach, the Department of Islamic History plays a vital role in promoting scholarly pursuits, producing competent professionals, and contributing to the overall knowledge and understanding of Islamic civilization.

# xii. Malayalam

The department of Malayalam at Maharaja's College Ernakulam was established in 1925, during the golden jubilee year of the college's affiliation to Madras University. Initially, Malayalam was taught as a Part II Second Language for the three-year BA/BSc Degree Courses, under the guidance of renowned Sanskrit teachers such as Karunakara Pisharady, Rama Pisharady, and Anantha Narayana Shastri. The Oriental language department was headed by the distinguished poet and superintendent of languages, Pandit K.P Karuppan, who is believed to be one of the first teachers of Malayalam. In 1936, the department was further enriched with the addition of Mahakavi G. SankaraKurup, the first recipient of

the prestigious Jnanpith Award in 1965. His presence in the college greatly benefited the student community, and he was just one of many distinguished scholars, critics, and poets to teach in the department. Some other notable figures include Prof. Kuttipurath Kesavan Nair, Prof. P.V Krishnan Nair, Prof. C. L Antony, Prof. M. K Sanu, Dr. M. Leelavathy, Prof. Gupthan Nair, Prof. M. Krishan Nair, Prof. O. N.V Kurup, Prof. K. G SankaraPilla, and C. Ayyappan. It is worth noting that Prof. O.N.V Kurup, a renowned poet and lyricist, was also honored with the Jnanpith Award in 2007. The Department of Malayalam at Maharaja's College Ernakulam has a long and illustrious history of producing some of the most distinguished scholars and writers in the field, and its legacy continues to inspire and shape the future of Malayalam language and literature.

The Department of Malayalam has been home to a rich tradition of literary luminaries, including writers, critics, and poets who have published numerous books on literature and grammar. One of its most illustrious alumni is G. Sankarakurup, who won the first-ever Jnanpith Award in 1965. He also served as the third Head of the Department of Malayalam. Another distinguished faculty member of the department is O.N.V Kurup, who was also honored with the Jnanpith Award in 2007. The department has had many outstanding heads, including Prof. S. Joseph, a celebrated poet who won the Kerala Sahitya Akademi Award in 2012 and the Odakuzhal Award in 2015 for Poetry. He has published eight collections of poetry, including a volume translated into English, as well as a novel and a critical study. His works have been included in publications by Penguin and Oxford, and his poems have been featured in Poem Hunter and Poetry International. Several universities and autonomous colleges in Kerala have included his poems in their syllabi, and his works have been translated into various Indian and foreign languages. Prof. S. Joseph is also a member of the Kerala Sahitya Akademi and the Lalithakala Akademi, further attesting to the department's strong legacy of fostering literary excellence.

#### Result analysis

40 students appeared for the BA Malayalam final exams. Out of it 30 students passed (75%). Out of 30 students 1 student got A+, 11 students got A, 9 students got B+, 3 students got B, and 2 students got C. 10 students failed in the exam. 26 students appeared for MA Malayalam final exam. The pass percentage is 96%. Above them 7 got A+ (above 90%), 10 got A, 2 of them got B+ and B for 1.1failed in the exam.

#### xvii. Political Science

The department of political science was established in 1950, the same year when Maharaja's College celebrated its diamond jubilee. Initially, Political Science was included as one among the key subjects in the Pre-Degree programme. The department was granted Bachelor Degree programme in Political Science in 1964. Graduation in political science, blended with two complementary subjects; history and economics, opens up to the students a vast array of opportunities to help shaping their career in the fields of Teaching, civil services, public policy analysis, law etc. A Political Science degree not only offers theoretical knowledge and intellectual background required to gain academic and administrative jobs, but it also enables the students to assimilate democratic values and secular outlook to assist them to offer meaningful contributions to the society. The department started offering Master's programme in Political Science in 1970. The curriculum of the post-graduate programme is developed with a view to provide advanced knowledge in Political Science on the one hand and to give training and guidance to students in developing research skills on the other. In addition, the department gives ample facilities for the students to prepare for competitive examinations. The department has contributed a good number of teachers, civil servants, researchers, journalists, politicians etc. to the country. In 2009 the department was elevated as a Research Centre under Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam. Under the able guidance of four research supervisors, sixteen scholars are currently pursuing research on various subjects including environmental politics, political theory, transgender studies, policy studies etc.

#### Academic planning

Before the start of the academic year, a meeting was held by the Academic Council, the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), the Internal Examination Committee, and the Controller of Examinations to formulate an action plan for the current academic year. In accordance with their directives, the Sanskrit Department organized a faculty meeting in June 2021 at the Sanskrit HOD Room. During the meeting, the syllabus and the semester timetable were thoroughly discussed and finalized. The names of the Class Tutors, Co-Class Tutors, and Second Language Tutors were also decided upon. Additionally, schedules were established for the Board of Studies, the timely completion of internal assessments (assignments, seminars, class tests), departmental co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, and other programs. Overall, the meeting was instrumental in laying out a comprehensive plan for the academic year ahead.

#### Review of teaching -learning process

The department regularly conducts reviews of its teaching-learning process, structures, methodologies, and learning outcomes at periodic intervals. At the end of each semester, teachers gather feedback from students to improve their teaching practices. After the publication of the semester exam results, the department analyses the results and implements corrective measures to enhance student outcomes. Additionally, feedback on the curriculum and the attainment of graduate attributes is collected from students following the end of semester exams. Furthermore, department-level induction and orientation programs are organized for newly admitted students to ensure a smooth transition into the program. The department is committed to continuously improving its academic offerings to provide students with the best possible learning experience.

In compliance with the master timetable and time restrictions suggested by the DCE, a new timetable was prepared for online classes. To facilitate smooth online classes, the college provided official email IDs for all faculty members and students. The UG syllabus was revised, incorporating suggestions from stakeholders and implemented in the 2021-22 academic year. Additionally, a new course related to the environment was introduced in all UG programs. To enhance the learning experience, all first-year UG students were enrolled in the Swayam Portal. The SQAC was formed, with toppers from each class in the department nominated to assure the quality of students in academic and non-academic matters. The tutorial and mentoring systems were also implemented to assist students in various ways. Various committees and organizations were established to support needy students in coping with online classes. Overall, the department is committed to providing students with a quality education that supports their academic and personal growth.

In collaboration with the Jeevani Centre, the department took measures to monitor the mental health of all students and provided counselling support to those in need. In light of the pandemic situation, the tutorial and mentoring systems were strengthened to better support students' academic needs. Remedial teaching is provided to weaker students based on the analysis of result reports. By applying scientific methods, slow and advanced learners were identified, and special programs were arranged for all students falling into these categories. The department is committed to ensuring that all students receive the necessary support to succeed academically and personally.

### <u>Initiatives in managing the online teaching-learning</u>

The institution has an e-learning platform, Moodle, which enables teachers to share their eresources with students. To conduct online classes, teachers are utilizing Google Meet, and both teachers and students are encouraged to attend MOOC courses offered through Swayam. In order to implement the LMS effectively, IQAC of Maharaja's College organized a seven-day training program on Moodle LMS, which was attended by all faculty members. Additionally, a training program on e-content development was organized for all faculty members by the Cell. With the help of the Website Committee, the college issued N-list passwords for all students to access the N-list e-library. The faculty members effectively handle all teaching, learning, and evaluation activities using different online platforms such as G-Suite and Moodle. The department is committed to leveraging technology to provide students with quality education and support their academic growth.

### **Internal Examination**

The department is committed to ensuring that internal examinations for all UG and PG classes are conducted in a timely and efficient manner. In compliance with the Academic Calendar and the directives of the Internal Exam Committee, internal examinations for odd and even semesters are conducted seamlessly. To ensure that students can take these exams comfortably, the Department's classrooms are used as exam halls, and invigilation duties are assigned to faculties as per the preplanned timetable hours. The invigilation duty is carried out meticulously to maintain the academic integrity of the examination process. The valuation of exams is done in a fair and unbiased manner, and results are published and communicated to students promptly. The Department strives to ensure that students' academic progress is not hindered in any way and that all examination-related activities are carried out transparently and efficiently.

### Research Activities

The department of Sanskrit has a rich legacy of research and scholarship, and it has been recognized as a Research Department since 1991. This recognition is a testament to the quality of research and scholarly activities conducted by the faculty members and students of the Department. In line with this, two esteemed teachers from the Department have been recognized as Research guides, providing valuable guidance and mentorship to research scholars. Currently, there are four research scholars enrolled in the Department, and one research scholar joined during this academic year, further enhancing the research activities of the department. To foster a culture of research and scholarship, the Department regularly organizes events and activities to showcase the research progress made by the faculty members and students. Recently, all the research scholars presented their research progress, and

the department arranged live streaming of these events using a newly purchased live streaming studio. Additionally, to exhibit the publications of teachers and students, the Department has set up a publication wall in the College, providing a platform to showcase the research output and scholarly achievements of the Department.

The department's Research Committee plays a pivotal role in organizing various research-related activities, and recently it organized course work classes for research scholars through an online platform. These classes provided valuable insights into research methodology, data analysis, and other essential research-related topics. The Department is committed to fostering a research-oriented culture, providing necessary support to research scholars, and ensuring that the research activities of the Department align with the institution's vision and mission.

### Seven criteria

As part of department auditing procedure on academic and non-academic activities, we have arranged all the seven criterion vice documents as follows:

### Criterion 1

The department maintains hard copies of the syllabus for both undergraduate and postgraduate programs, including revisions made in 2016, 2019, and 2020. To ensure the quality of education, the department conducts regular meetings of the Board of Studies, both internal and external, with minutes being recorded and maintained in a register kept in the department. All department faculty members are included as members of the B.O.S. While no MoUs with relevant organizations are in place until December 2022, the department plans to sign MoUs with SSUS Kalady starting in 2023. The department offers a value-added course on Yoga with a structured syllabus and brochure, and keeps a list of students enrolled in the course, along with attendance records. The department also assigns project work for final-year undergraduate and postgraduate students based on the syllabus, and maintains a list of students undertaking student projects with proof of completion certificates.

#### Criterion 2

Criterion 2 covers various aspects of student admission and engagement, and the department has taken several measures to ensure the smooth functioning of these activities. The admission process is well-documented with an admission register that includes the bio data of all students admitted, including those admitted under reserved categories. After the first regular UG class, a bridge course is conducted by the department with a structured syllabus. In addition, special coaching is provided to students during regular teaching hours, and an hour-long exam is conducted to evaluate their progress. Based on the evaluation report, students are categorized as slow or fast learners, and remedial programs are conducted for slow learners.

The department has also prepared a result analysis report after the end-semester exams. To promote student-centric methods, the department maintains a register with the names and list of ICT-enabled tools, including online resources. Each faculty member is assigned a group of 10 or fewer students as mentees. Circulars have been issued regarding assigning mentors and documenting mentor-

mentee interactions in a Mentor's Diary. The department maintains documentation for various aspects of the academic year, including the teaching plan, seat matrix, teacher's diary, student class log book, attendance register, and time table for odd and even semesters. These documents are geotagged with necessary photos to ensure their authenticity and accuracy.

### Criterion 3

The department maintains a record of fellowships received by teachers during the academic year 21-22, along with details of grants received for the projects during the same period. The orders related to these awards are kept on file. Additionally, the department has recognized teachers as research guides, and copies of the order from 21-22 are maintained. The department also conducts seminars and workshops throughout the year, and details of these events, including brochures and photos, are recorded. The department registers Ph.D. students, and a copy of the registration order is documented. Research publications by faculty members in Scopus indexed, Web of Science indexed, and CARE journals are also recorded, with copies of the relevant pages kept on file.

The department encourages faculty members to publish books and contribute chapters in edited volumes, and copies of the relevant pages of books published during the academic year 21-22 are kept on file. Furthermore, the department maintains a record of awards and recognition received by teachers and students for extension activities, with copies of the award letters from 21-22 stored in department archives. The department also conducts extension and outreach programs, including government-initiated initiatives such as Swach Bharat, Aids Awareness, Gender Issues, as well as programs organized in collaboration with industry, community, and NGOs. Reports with photos of these events are recorded. The department also conducts extension and outreach programs through NSS/NCC, and details of these events, along with photos, are recorded.

The department collaborates with other institutions for research, faculty exchange, student exchange, internships, on-the-job training, and project work. Certificates related to these collaborative activities during the academic year 21-22 are maintained on file. Finally, the department keeps a record of functional MoUs with institutions of national and international importance, other universities, industries, and corporate houses, and copies of the functional MoUs signed during the year are kept on file.

### Criterion 5

This criterion includes various details related to the students of the department. A self-attested list of students who are availing scholarships provided by the government, along with the name of the scheme and the number of beneficiaries, is maintained in the department. Similarly, a self-attested list of students availing scholarships from non-governmental agencies or the institution is also maintained, along with the name of the schemes and contact information of the agencies, and the number of beneficiaries. The department has organized capacity development programs and skill enhancement programs for students. The department maintains a list of students who have been successfully placed after completion of their course, along with the name of the employer and their contact details. Any

document such as pay slip, appointment order must also be kept as proof. The list of students who are pursuing higher studies must also be maintained with necessary proof. It is also important to keep a list of students who have qualified in national/international exams along with relevant certificates as proof. Details of students who have won awards/medals for outstanding performance in inter-university, state, national, or international sports and cultural events must also be included. Alumni meetings, contributions, and events organized by the department are also documented in a detailed report. Keeping all these details will help in the proper functioning of the department and serve as a reference for future use.

### Criterion 6

This criterion pertains to the documentation of faculty details within the department. It includes the average percentage of teachers who were provided with financial support to attend conferences, workshops, and professional body memberships during the 2021-2022 academic year. Additionally, the average number of professional development and administrative training programs organized by the institution for teaching and non-teaching staff during the same period is also recorded. The average percentage of teachers attending professional development programs such as orientation, refresher courses, short-term courses, and faculty development programs is also documented. In the 2021-2022 academic year, we did not receive any funds or grants from non-government bodies, individuals, or philanthropists. We have submitted our annual report and future plan for the 2022-2023 academic year.

### Criterion 7

Criterion VII focuses on the initiatives taken by the department towards creating a more inclusive, gender-sensitive, and environmentally conscious environment. In line with this, we have organized talks by social workers and trans-gender individuals to sensitize students on issues related to gender, sexuality, and human rights. We have also taken steps towards promoting eco-friendly practices such as implementing recycling programs, using sustainable materials, and reducing paper waste. In order to create a more inclusive environment, we have conducted sensitization programs for students on values, rights, duties, and responsibilities. We celebrate and organize national and international days and events such as International Women's Day, World Environment Day, and World Human Rights Day. These events are documented with detailed reports and geo-tagged photos. While we were unable to conduct some best practices such as food fests and job fairs due to the pandemic, we recognize the importance of documenting any such initiatives according to their title, objective, context, practice, and evidence of success. We will continue to strive towards creating a more inclusive, equitable, and sustainable environment in the future.

### xix. Statistics

The department of statistics was established in 1975 by converting two posts of lecturers in mathematics. The Government of Kerala appointed Sri B. Devadas and Sri K. J. Justin George Francis as the first lecturers in Statistics in June 1976. Later, an additional post was created to accommodate the workload of the department. From 1975 to 1987, statistics teachers worked under the department of mathematics. In June 1987, the department of statistics emerged as an independent department. The PG

programme in statistics gained prominence in 1995 when Prof. Justin George Francis served as the head of the department, along with Smt. T. M. Marykutty and Dr. S. Santhosh as faculty members. In the same academic year, the department was strengthened with the addition of five more lecturers: Sri K. A. Rajeevan Pillai, Smt. R. Thankam, Sri T. V. Francy, and Dr. N. Hitha. In June 1998, Prof. M. Sreekumar joined the department as HOD, and under his guidance, the department has soared to new heights.

Today, the department of statistics is a renowned research centre that offers undergraduate and postgraduate courses. The department has eight experienced faculty members who are dedicated to imparting quality education to students. The department is equipped with state-of-the-art infrastructure, including a computer lab and a library, to aid research and learning. The students of the department are consistently performing well in academics and various research activities. The department also conducts national and international seminars, workshops, and conferences to enhance the knowledge of students and faculty. The alumni of the department are well-placed in prestigious institutions and companies, and they continue to support the department's growth and development.

### Course offered

The department of statistics has been offering a full-time Post-Graduate course in Statistics since 1995. The department has been successful in attracting bright and enthusiastic students who are keen on pursuing a career in Statistics. The faculty members are dedicated, talented, and committed to their students, helping them in every possible way to achieve their academic goals. The department has a separate block with a well-equipped laboratory and library to provide students with an excellent learning environment. Over the years, the department has produced outstanding results for the PG program. Regular enrichment programs are conducted by the department to enhance students' knowledge and skills to pursue better opportunities in education and career. Many of our students have secured placements in both private and government sectors. The department conducts enrichment lecture series, seminars, workshops, and Statistics clubs that further enrich the learning experience of the students. The faculty members are research-oriented, and their expertise is evident in the numerous publications in reputed referred journals. In addition to the PG program, the department also offers a Ph.D. program in Statistics to provide students with an opportunity to pursue advanced research in the field. The department is committed to providing the students with excellent learning opportunities and preparing them for a successful career in Statistics.

## Facilities of the Department

Smart Class Room and Computer Lab

In order to implement ICT facilities in the department, one of the class rooms has been converted into a Smart Class room. We have well equipped computer lab with 25 computers, Wi-Fi and high speed internet facility. Licensed software like SPSS, MATLAB, R, MS OFFICE, WINDOWS and C++ are made use of. The P. G. students do their practical using SAS, MATLAB, R and Excel.

### Result analysis of IV semester M.Sc.
