About the College

Maharaja's College (Government Autonomous), located in the rapidly growing city of Cochin, is an exceptional institution that offers higher education with a distinct character. It boasts a rich heritage and remarkable accomplishments in various domains, including the creation and dissemination of knowledge, fostering liberal and secular values, promoting inclusive growth and development, and empowering

marginalized communities to attain upward social mobility. The college campus, sprawling across 25 acres, is conveniently accessible by road, rail, air, metro rail, and waterways. It is a picturesque and serene oasis amid the city's hustle and bustle, thanks to the lush greenery, shady trees, thick foliage and pristine water ponds that create a tranquil atmosphere.

The college had a humble inception as a Basic English school way back in 1845, established in the former princely state of Cochin with the primary objective of providing "instruction to the students that would enable them to converse with Englishmen without interpreters." However, over the years, the college has evolved significantly and gained recognition as a 'Centre of Excellence' by the Government of Kerala and as a 'College with Potential for Excellence' by the University Grants Commission (UGC). This growth has been gradual but consistent, and today, the college stands tall as a distinguished institution for higher education.

The original elementary school founded in 1845 underwent several transformations over time, eventually becoming a college in 1875 in response to the increasing demand for higher education in Cochin and neighbouring states of Travancore and British Malabar. Originally named 'The Ernakulam College' and affiliated to the University of Madras, it offered First Arts Courses and quickly rose to become one of the premier educational institutions in the Madras Presidency. Like other colonial institutions across the country, Maharaja's had British principals at the helm. These enlightened individuals played a critical role in popularizing English education in the state of Cochin. The first principal, Professor A.F. Sealy (1875-1892), described himself and his compatriots as "labourers in educational work" dedicated to "bringing light to one of the dark regions of Asia." Despite this, he acknowledged that their work was simply "a just repayment of an old debt of gratitude that the West owes to the East."

The Golden Jubilee Year (1925) proved memorable in more than one way. The college was permanently rechristened as Maharaja's College. It started offering Bachelor of Arts programmes in a number of disciplines, thereby raising itself to the status of a first grade college, turned residential by building hostels and formed an Old Students' Association which must surely be one of the oldest in the country. The next decade would witness a spurt in the number of programmes offered, especially in sciences and the addition of a 15- acre playground, on the land donated by the aristocratic Thottekat family.

Following India's independence and the formation of the state of Kerala in 1956, Maharajas began to expand its postgraduate programs and prioritized inclusivity by admitting students from marginalized and disadvantaged social backgrounds. Throughout the 1970s and 80s, the college experienced a surge in enrolment and

celebrated its grand centenary in 1975. The college has seen remarkable growth in the number of female students and teachers, and the gender ratio became skewed in favour of women during the 1990s. Additionally, the college responded to changing times by offering new, innovative programs like B.Sc. Instrumentation and B.Sc. Environment & Water Management in the 1990s.

In the new millennium, Maharaja's began to place greater emphasis on technology-enhanced teaching and learning by establishing state-of-the-art ICT facilities. The number of researchers also surged, and the college is now a Centre of Excellence with 19 teaching departments offering 20 undergraduate, 21 postgraduate, 1 integrated and 18 doctoral programmes. Undergraduate courses range from music and commerce to computer applications, showcasing the diversity of the college's academic offerings. The college has three hostels and a 15-acre playground with a synthetic track and pavilion. In 2010, the Department of Science and Technology (DST) selected all the science departments of the college for special assistance under the Fund for Improvement of S&T Infrastructure (FIST) programme. The college received A grade accreditation from the NAAC in both 2006 and 2013.

The college has been doing well in the Mahatma Gandhi University youth festival, bagging the first place or runner-up position consistently. Many of the winners have cut a niche for themselves in the fields of cinema, television or other media. In terms of achievements in academic evaluation, the college has managed to maintain the streak of success successively. The college got a shot in the arm with its inclusion in the Cluster of Colleges, a body exclusively formed to share the resources of a few select colleges in and around the city. Various activities were undertaken by the Cluster in the last few years. In 2014-15, the college was elevated to the status of an autonomous college. It is the first and the only government autonomous college in Kerala.

1. The Governing Body

Maharaja's College holds the prestigious distinction of being the only autonomous college in the government sector in the state. This esteemed institution has been autonomous since the year 2015, which has contributed significantly to its growth and development. As an autonomous college, Maharaja's operates with a certain degree of independence and has the authority to design and implement its own academic programs, curriculum, and evaluation systems. This empowerment enables the college to adapt its educational offerings to the changing needs of students and the evolving demands of the job market.

At the core of the autonomous structure lies the Governing Body (GB), which serves as the apex body of the college. Comprising distinguished individuals from various spheres of society, including renowned academicians, government representatives, and experts from relevant fields, the Governing Body plays a crucial role in guiding and overseeing the college's functioning. The GB of Maharaja's College exercises its authority in key decision-making processes related to academic policies, infrastructure development, and overall institutional governance. It provides insights, expertise, and strategic direction to ensure the college's continued growth and excellence in education.

Functions of the Governing Body:

Subject to the provisions outlined in the bylaws of the respective college and the rules established by the state government or the parent university, the GB holds several crucial responsibilities to ensure the effective functioning and development of the institution:

- a) Guiding the college: The GB serves as a guiding force, ensuring that the college operates in line with the objectives for which it was granted autonomous status. It provides strategic direction, monitors progress, and offers valuable insights to promote the overall growth and excellence of the college.

- c) Approval of new programmess: The GB plays a vital role in expanding the academic offerings of Maharaja's College. - d) Approval of annual budget: As a key authority, the GB approves the annual budget of the college. Deliberations and Decisions

The member secretary reported that as per the previous GB Meeting decisions the proposals received from ITI Palakkad and KEL for the development of new Campus software were demonstrated in front of an expert committee consisting of 3 members belonging to Computer Science discipline. Based on these two presentations, the Expert Committee unanimously recommended the KEL for awarding the software application development work. The GB has directed the Member secretary to comply the suggestion of the expert committee and a detailed offline meeting shall be convened on 4th April 2023 with KEL, attended by all the committee conveners who have to give inputs for the development of software in various stages like admission, examination, and website.

The following amendments in reforming the examination system approved by GB meeting held on 13 February, 2023, presented by Dr.Jolly V Antony were also approved.

III. Deliberations and Decisions

The GB expresses strong dissent against the frequent news about tarnishing the image of the college and its functioning in the media recently without any basis. The GB demands that stringent response and action must be taken against the malignant nexus within and outside the college who deliberately try to damage the dignity of the college in the present scenario. This action is very imperative since such blemishes shall affect even the national ranking of the institution and thereby the future funding and student intake as well.

1. Approval of the minutes of the previous GB meeting held on the 21st of May 2022.

The minutes of the previous meeting is approved.

2. Action taken report of the previous GB meeting

- 2.1 It is reported that the file in connection with illegal tree cutting in the college campus had been sent to the DCE for verification and received back. But no report has been received from DCE so far in this regard.
- 2.2 It is reported that the Head Accountant is given a note to remit the exam fee collected by online in 2019-20 up to 31/01/2020. Necessary steps are being taken to withdraw from the Bank Account of the Principal, the amount collected from students as the fees by online mode under the heads of admission fee, examination fee and registration fee and remit them in the respective heads in the Government treasury. Admission fees collected in the year 2020-21 up to 31/01/2020 has been remitted in the respective heads. In the year 2021-22 UG registration fees is remitted in the general P D account and the steps for remitting PG registration fees to this account is completed. A letter has been sent to the NIC seeking assistance to generate report regarding the registration fees of 2019-20 and admission fees of 2021-22. Steps are being taken to remit the registration fees (19/07/2022) into the general PD account in the Government treasury.
- 2.3 The university registration process of students admitted in the years 2019-20 and 2020-21 has been completed. The university registration process of students admitted in the year 2021-22 is being done.

- 2.4 The Website Committee is entrusted with the task of updating the College website into a dynamic one. A Technical Committee shall be constituted consisting of technical experts from Cochin University, Model Engineering College and State IT Mission for enabling and monitoring the overall ICT facilities of the college. The Website committee can procure the assistance of this Technical Committee as well. The Website Committee is directed to go ahead with the process of redesigning the website with the support of the NIC and the newly constituted technical committee.
- 2.5 It is reported that the two teachers of the Department of History, Dr.Divya G and Smt. Geetha P.C. who were issued memo in connection with enquiry about students' complaint about the flaws in the valuation of answer scripts and had submitted their explanation, and at present they are transferred from this institution on their request. The GB evaluated the gravity of their grievous flaws and observed that their explanation are not satisfactory, and hence repeatedly recommended that this issue must be reported to the DCE for departmental action.
- 2.6 The GB approved the request from the co-ordinator for Central Instrumentation Facility regarding the qualification fixed for the Technical Assistant to be appointed for Centralised Instrumentation Facility as MSc. Chemistry (priority in Analytical Chemistry) with an additional experience in handling GCMS and UV-VIS. The GB also decided that a request shall be sent to the DCE for appointing a permanent staff in future, since the college has initiated the process of setting up a full-fledged Centralised Instrumentation Facility in the coming future.

- 2.7 It is reported that as follow up action to get the renewal of autonomy, copies of the proposal for renewing the autonomous status of the college have been sent to the UGC and M G University and have got assurance that the UGC has received the proposal.
- 2.8 GB examined the Plan Fund proposals for infrastructure (2022-23) submitted to the DCE and opined that accredited agencies for furnishing of the library, such as Forest Industries Travancore (FIT), Artisans Development Corporation (ADC) can be approached for better and quicker Library interior works and other accredited agencies such as Police Construction Society, State Nirmithi Kendra etc. for toilet block construction.
- 2.9 It is reported that one system administrator for the 2022-23 has been appointed as per the CDC decision. The period of temporary staff appointed as part of the works in connection with the autonomous status of the college has been extended for three months. From Kudumbasree Mission, three sweepers have been appointed, the salary of two of them shall be met from the CDC fund and one from the Autonomy PD fund.

2.10 An interim order has been sent for the security audit of the five modules in the Campus suite programme and the same has been sent to the DCE for ratification. Considering the urgency of the audit of the admission module, it is done and its expenditure has been met from the admission fee of 2021-22. Steps are being taken to process the bills of the remaining modules.

2.11 The GB expressed concern about the faults in the examination process with regard to electricity failure and recommended that the faculty in charge of Additional Chief superintendent may be removed from the present post.

2.12 As per the decision of the GB meeting on 12th of February, 2021 the GB directs the Accommodation Committee to take steps to facilitate the shifting of IQAC room from the GB Chairman's cabin to the first floor room facing the Computer/ Front Office room of system administrator. This room will be functioned as the IQAC room hereafter. The Governing Body is to be given the full-fledged Board room for conducting Board meetings and Standing committee meetings and Chairman's Cabin facilities in the present VIP lounge. Both the rooms should have their respective boards affixed.

2.13 The File management system of the college office is to be made intact by setting up file storage space with almirahs in Room No 14.

3. Ratification of Deputy Controller Appointment

In the vacancy arisen on the retirement of Smt.Subida M.D, Deputy Controller of Examinations, Dr. Neena George, Assistant professor of Chemistry is appointed on 14.06.2022. This appointment is ratified by the GB. The GB expressed the opinion to strictly adhere to the UGC guidelines regarding the constitution of Examination Cell in autonomous Colleges and recommended for creating additional Deputy Controller posts considering the increased number of courses and students in the recent years. It is also observed to limit the tenure of teachers working as Deputy Controllers as three years, following the UGC guidelines. The Examination Standing Committee of the GB is directed to study the matter and present a report in the next GB meeting with regard to the reconstitution of the Examination Cell and the feasible remuneration of the teachers in charge.

4. Review of the ongoing construction work

Necessary Steps are to be taken to get water connection in the Academic complex and both water and electricity connections in the Centralised Library. It is reported that 40% of work is completed in the construction of New Auditorium, Chemistry block second floor and renovation of Staff Hostel. 85% of college maintenance and drainage works is done. As regards the relaying of synthetic track a revised estimate for 8.73cr is given by PWD, for which new AS and allotment is required from the Government. In the case of Hockey Turf Project, the MOU with Kerala Sports Department is modified and sent to its Chief Engineer.

5. Inauguration of new hostel

The Principal has to take necessary steps to handing over the charge of the new hostel and adopt immediate measures for the electrification and water connection of the hostel. Underground storage water tank, compound wall and Kitchen shall be constructed by the PWD from the unspent amount. Steps may be taken to get Administrative Sanction in this regard. After making necessary alterations to suit the needs of girls' hostel, fitness certificate may be procured from the PWD to this effect.

6.Library shifting to new complex

GB examined the report submitted by the librarian and directed the member secretary to take necessary measures for the shifting of the library.

7. Request from students regarding internal re-do

GB examined the request from Akash Saji (B A Economics 2015-18) and granted permission for internal re-do by considering the sanction of such cases by the Parent (MG University) University.

8. Any other matter permitted by the Chair.

8.1 Request for revaluation

Manjusha M.M., a student of UG Commerce has submitted an application to consider her request for revaluation of third semester Common course English paper "Understanding India" of which she had failed to apply within the stipulated time. The GB has decided to sanction her request after obtaining superfine for her application in this regard.

8.2. Request for grace mark distribution

Eldho Stanley (B.A. Music 2019-2022) and Kamal Mohan J S (M. A. Music 2020-22) have requested to consider their grace marks received from University Youth festival 2022 to be added to the previous semester marks. As this is against the university rule that grace marks shall be provided only to the examinations conducted in the performing year, GB cannot give consent to their request.

8.3. Action regarding examination malpractice

As per the recommendations of the examination subcommittee, GB decided to cancel the entire I semester examination results of Vishnu K V (BA Sanskrit Reg No. 18160015), Aparna V. P (BSc Zoology, Reg No. 21180017), Nandana K. B (BA Hindi, 21070041) and the only one examination (PG1POLC02 PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION THEORY AND CONCEPTS) result in which Sreethu P S (MA politics, Reg No.21590025) did malpractice.

8.4.Admission opportunity for students awaiting supplementary results in M G University and SAY exam results in Maharaja's College

Considering the fact that MG University has extended application submission for PG courses till 2022 July 31 due to the delay in results of their supplementary and private registration examinations, and since the SAY exam results of our college shall be published by 2022 August 10th only, it is decided that students who become eligible for admission after the publication of these results will be given an opportunity for applying in the 2022 PG admissions of our college as soon as the SAY examination results are published. Those students who get qualified with index marks greater than the last admitted index mark of each course through the usual admission procedure, shall be admitted to a programme by creating seats over and above the sanctioned strength, after which approval shall be got from the parent university.

8.5. Alumni Management System

The proposal submitted by Dr.Shiji K, Alumni coordinator for hiring an online alumni management portal is examined and found useful. The estimated budget is Rs 85,000/- per year. The GB decided to begin this proposed portal and directed the member secretary to go ahead with the process by finding out the require fund from the suitable resources available.

8.6.Seat Increase

The applications for marginal seat increase submitted by certain departments are to be considered and necessary steps may be taken to further approval of the increased seats.

8.7Anomaly in issuing rank certificate

There has occurred a flaw in the issue of rank certificate in B A Economics Honours batch 2019-2022 The rank certificate is issued to Nithuna, whereas Punya became the top scorer while revaluation results were added to the consolidated marks. GB considers this fault as a grave one and directs the Examination standing committee to conduct an enquiry and submit the report at the earliest.

8.8.Installing the photo of Olympian Chandrasekhar in the stadium

The OSA of the college has requested permission to install a photo of Olympian Chandrasekharan in the stadium pavilion. The GB approved of this request.

8.9. Allocation of rooms

The Accommodation Committee shall be directed to allocate room facilities for prominent committees and cells like Placement Cell, Women Cell and Ladies waiting room as early as possible.

8.10.Reconstitution of Examination Standing Committee

The present Examination Standing Committee is reconstituted. The new committee will have Dr. Jolly V.Antony (Examination sub committee) as convenor and Dr. Suresh Mathew, Dr. M.S. Murali and Dr. Suja T.V. as members.

III. Deliberations and Decisions

1. Approval of the minutes of the previous GB meeting held on the 23rd of July 2022.

The minutes of the previous meeting is approved.

3. Action taken report of the previous GB meeting

2. 1 The amount received as fees from students till date and the e-grants received so far have been remitted in the respective heads of Government and University, thus cleared all the arrears in this regard. The admission fees collected during the year 2022-23 will be remitted in the University at the closure of the current admission process. The documents and affidavits in the prescribed format along with the University fees remitted in the heads of QC verification and matriculation, except for

those who are yet to receive e grants, as e-chalan necessary for the registration process of 751 UG students and 409 PG students have been submitted to the University.

- 2.2 The Principal/member secretary is authorized with the task of having an expert consultation and selection of a suitable student life cycle management software along with an upgraded software for updating our college website. It is decided that the service of IIT Palakkkad or other reputed academic institution may be utilized on consultancy basis for the same.
- 2.3 The Principal/member secretary reported that the enquiry report and the findings in connection with the valuation flaws of the two teachers of the Department of History, Dr.Divya G and Smt. Geetha P.C. is reported to the DCE for departmental action and awaiting orders.
- 2. 4.The request from the co-ordinator for Central Instrumentation Facility regarding the appointment of a Technical Assistant with a qualification of MSc. Chemistry (priority in Analytical Chemistry) with an additional experience in handling GCMS and UV-VIS is sent to the DCE for approval.
- 4. The Principal reported that the faculty in charge of the Additional Chief Superintendent has been removed from the post as a penalty of the serious faults in the examination conduct during electricity failure.
- 2. 6. As approved by the GB, the OSA of the college has ceremoniously installed a photo of Olympian Chandrasekharan, the first Olympian of the college in the stadium pavilion.
- 2.7. As per the GB decision proceedings of the newly constituted Examination Standing Committee is issued with Dr. Jolly V. Antony (Examination sub committee) as convenor and Dr. Suresh Mathew, Dr. M.S. Murali and Dr. Suja T.V. as members.

5. Permanent and Current Seat Increase

As per the government order to apply for marginal increase, the college has applied to the University and got sanction for seat increase in various UG and PG programmes. Steps are being taken to apply for permanent seat increase in the programmes, especially the most sought after ones like B Com and B A English at the earliest.

6. Reconstitution of Examination Cell

Adhering to the UGC guidelines about the three year tenure of teachers working in the Examination Cell, teachers who have completed more than three years are replaced and reconstituted the Examination Cell with Dr. K. Krishnakumar, (Associate Professor of Botany) as Controller of Examinations, Dr. Neena George (Assistant professor of Chemistry) as Joint Controller, and Sri. Georgekutty Cherian (Assistant professor of Economics), Smt. Sruthymol K.S. (Assistant Professor of Hindi), Dr. K.P. Prasanthkumar (Assistant Professor of Chemistry) and Dr. Balakrishnan R.(Assistant Professor of Mathematics) as Deputy Controllers.

7. Appointment of temporary staff (Autonomy)

The GB approved the rank lists of Data Entry Operators, Part time Clerks and Office Assistants presented by the Principal. Taking due consideration of the external subject expert's remarks that no candidate is qualified for the post of system administrator, it is decided to re-notify the post of System Administrator and initiate a recruitment process with external experts at the earliest for filling this post.

6. Review of the ongoing infrastructure work

Necessary Steps are to be taken to get water connection in the Academic complex and both water and electricity connections in the Centralised Library. It is reported that 42% of the work is completed in the construction of New Auditorium, Chemistry block second floor and renovation of Staff Hostel. 95% of college maintenance and drainage works is done. As regards the relaying of synthetic track a revised estimate for 8.73cr is given by PWD, for which new AS and allotment is required from the Government. In the case of Hockey Turf Project, the MOU with Kerala Sports Department is modified and sent to its Chief Engineer.

7. Inauguration of new hostel

Request has been sent to DCE for getting the AS for the construction of compound wall, kitchen and Fire & Safety system. On completion of these works, the hostel can be converted into a Ladies' Hostel and the inauguration can be done at the earliest. GB opined that fixing an inauguration at a convenient date of the Hon.Minister of Higher Education shall help to accelerate the pending works and make a speedy facilitation of the new hostel for students. It is reported that from the CDC fund, an amount of Rs. Four lakhs has been granted for buying modern kitchen utensils and Rs. 40,000 for repairing old wooden coats, chairs and tables.

8. Library shifting to new complex

It is reported that AS has been obtained for SIDCO to undertake the interior furnishing work of the Centralised Library complex. In this context the GB entrusted the principal to constitute an Internal Monitoring Committee consisting of the teacher members of the GB along with librarian and other members who are in charge of the library, in order to have a close and consistent monitoring of the work ensuring quality and durability of the structure, materials and fittings related to this work.

9. Admission Process

The report from the convenor of Admission Committee is presented, which states that 91% (PG) and 90% (UG) admission to various programmes have been completed and it is expected to achieve a 97% completion by the 30th of September, 2022.

10. Enquiry report of anomaly in issuing Rank Certificate

The GB examined the report and observed that the software glitches shown as reason for the issue of rank position certificate cannot be regarded as a convincing reason for the mistake. The flaw has created a blemish in the reputation of the College. Intense care should taken for not repeating such errors in future. Also, stringent measures should be adopted to get back the wrongly issued Rank certificate.

11. Room allocation and functioning of various committees and clubs

The Principal presented the details of the report submitted by the Accommodation Committee along with the necessary recommendations for the allocation of rooms for needy departments, Cells, Clubs and others. Steps are being taken by various groups, committees and cells, NSS and NCC wings to set up their respective accommodation in the specific rooms allotted for them. Various clubs and committees have started their annual activities.

12. Examination Invigilation and Valuation anomalies

The enquiry report regarding the complaint against valuation in the Political Science department is examined by the GB. It is observed that the teacher concerned has been considerably strict in the valuation of answer scripts. The general norm of liberal valuation in public examinations conducted during the Covid period is not seen as observed in this case. It is decided that Sri. Antony Dawson should be reminded about

it and be warned to maintain caution in his future valuation duties and to adopt a student-friendly approach in valuing the answer scripts.

In the case of invigilation anomalies, wherein students were issued different question papers, such students should be given a chance to write a re-examination free of cost and their results have to be declared without delay.

The GB observes that the College Council should decide about the conduct of strict pre-valuation board meetings to discuss the scheme and mark distribution before every valuation process, and for convening of a general staff meeting to give necessary directions for invigilators on a day before the commencement of examinations. Such steps should be taken to ensure a flawless examination process in the college.

13. Clean Campus Initiatives

With the aid of the PTA, the college campus and premises are weeded and kept in tact. Steps are taken to allocate the college premises to various departments, monitored by the Nature Club, Bhoomithra Sena and NSS for a consistent maintenance of clean campus and efficient waste management.

14. Strengthening and Monitoring of Academic Activities

All Heads of the Departments are directed to ensure the smooth conduct of classes. The first internal examinations of VI semester UG and IV semester PG are completed. The III semester UG examinations are going on. Every class tutor is directed to prepare and publish monthly attendance statement and submit a copy to the vice- principal as well regularly. This has improved the class room presence of students.

15. Research Committee activities

The new Research Committee has to be activated to organize more programmes for the benefit of both teachers and students. Some departments have already begun their current year research programmes.

16. **IQAC Activities**

The Internal audit of SSR criterion wise department audit is going to be conducted on 29th September, 2022. There will also be an external audit next month. The GB

reminded the principal to issue proceedings of the External Peer Team of IQAC, the decision of which has been taken in an earlier GB meeting.

17. Any other matter permitted by the Chair.

17.1 A permanent clerical assistance in the office for GB related works.

It is decided that the college office should have an efficient clerical service provided for the execution of the GB decisions and maintenance of supporting file system.

17.2. Request for Mercy Chance for 2016-2019 batch student

The GB approved permitting mercy chance to in accordance with the university rules in this regard.

17.3 Request by a DA student for abstaining from classes due to her disability

According to the existing Government norms, the GB cannot make an affirmative decision in the request of Lakshmi Sivaprasad to stay home and study for the entire semester and come to college for writing the exams. This request can be allowed only if a government direction is sought and produced to this effect.

i) <u>UG/PG answer script valuation and revaluation/challenge valuation</u>

All end semester regular examination valuation should be done in centralized camp (CV camp). Teachers in the CV camp need not take regular classes. The HOD should take necessary steps for the conduct of classes by making use of the teachers not participating in the camp. If the HOD finds it difficult to manage classes it should be intimated to the Principal and the Principal can suspend classes of the respective departments.

CV camp should be started immediately on the next day after the end semester examination. 2 day CV camp is for the core courses and complementary courses. In that 2 day camp itself valuation and chief valuation should be completed. Chief examiner should be there in the second day to return the papers after completing the chief valuation. For common courses (English) and second language courses 3-day valuation camp can be conducted.

During CV camp 2 day semester break can be given. Semester break can be given only if the CV camp is next day immediately after the end semester examination.

Teachers who are assigned for revaluation/challenge valuation are not permitted to take answer scripts home. Valued papers should be returned

in the same day. No need to engage regular classes if no:of papers are more than 10.

The Principal (in-charge) made a presentation on the initiative taken by the Principal for the development of an integrated software for the effective management of the admission process and other academic activities of the college. The Governing Body meeting in principle agreed on the significant importance of an integrated software

for the effective management of admission, conduct of examinations and other academic activities of the college. The GB meeting discussed the details of this proposal and decided the following points;

a. This is not a modification of the software for admission, which has already been developed by the NIC. The Director of Collegiate Education in an earlier meeting held in 2019 with college authorities has agreed and issued sanction only for modifying the existing software for admission and permitted to make use of the money in the PD account maintained by the College Principal. The present proposal is for designing a new software which is comprehensive and integrated for the management of the entire academic activities of the college. Moreover, the cost involved for development of the new software comes to more than ninety lakhs rupees. Therefore, prior administrative sanction shall be obtained from the Director of Collegiate Education for awarding the contract to the organization/ firm concerned to execute the project and the draft MoU shall be approved by the DCE.

b. It is also decided that the Software Implementation and Monitoring Committee shall be constituted only after getting sanction from Directorate of Collegiate Education for awarding the contract for the same.

2. Introducing Allotment Fees for the Students with effect from 2023-24 Admission

The proposal for introducing allotment fees for admission was placed before the meeting by the Principal in -charge. The GB meeting has decided that introduction of any new fees or enhancement of the existing fees structure shall be decided only after due consultation with students organization and getting them in to confidence. Moreover, it should be part of the Admission Prospectus of the college. Therefore, we have to convene a meeting of the representatives of students organizations. The GB meeting entrusted Dr. Jollly V. Antony, Member of the GB to collect the status of such fees in other autonomous colleges within the university jurisdiction. The GB meeting has also decided to place the draft Admission Prospectus in the next GB meeting and get it approved.

3. Enhancement of Fees for the Existing Cost-sharing Courses from 2023-24

Governing Body meeting in principle agreed to enhance the fees of cost sharing courses in the college. This will be decided and the new fees structure will have to be fixed at par with the cost-sharing courses in other autonomous colleges under the MG University. The GB meeting entrusted Dr. Jolly V. Antony to collect the status of the fees structure in other colleges. This decision will have to be taken only after discussion with representatives of students organizations.

4. Conduct of Mercy Chance examination/ Examination related matters

All mercy chance examinations shall be conducted along with SAY examinations by the last week of May 2023. It is decided to conduct regular and supplementary II Semester UG and II Semester PG examinations by the third week of June, 2023.

5. Other Items Permitted by the Chair

5.1.Inauguration of the Ladies Hostel

It is decided to send a letter to the office of Higher Education Minister and Minister of Industries to seek their convenience for the inauguration of the ladies hostel by the I st week of June.

5.2. Examination Malpractices

The GB Meeting has decided to conduct speedy enquiry and strict action in cases of reported malpractice in the examination. The process and procedures existing in the mother university will have to be followed in the examination related malpractices. The GB meeting has also decided to conduct a meeting of Governing council with Controller of Examinations, Joint Controller, Deputy Controller and office staff of the examination wing on 6th May 2023 at 10.00 a.m. and another meeting with the officers and staff of the College Office on the same day at 2.00 p.m. The meeting came to an end at 12.30.p.m.

The meeting discussed and resolved the following agenda items:

1. Approval of the U.G. and P.G. Prospectus for admission in the academic year 2023-24.

The meeting started with an introductory remark by the Chairman. The Principal explained the agenda items and the urgency to convene an emergency meeting of the Governing Body. The Governing Body members examined the draft prospectus for U.G. and P.G. courses and observed that these two documents have been prepared in a well thought out manner after going through all reference materials of the UGC Guidelines and prospectus of other universities in Kerala, including MG University, Kottayam. The GB meeting has raised certain points for clarification and these points were well explained by the Admission Committee Co-ordinator and based on that the meeting approved the prospectus of U.G. and P.G. courses for the academic year 2023-24.

The Governing Body congratulated the Admission Committee convenors and coordinators who have prepared the PG and UG prospectus in a structured and well thought -out manner.

2. Any other matter permitted by the Chairman

2.1. Enhancing the Course Fee for Self-Financing Courses

The GB meeting has decided to enhance the fees of two cost sharing courses in the college, such as, BSc Environmental Chemistry and BSc Physics Instrumentation at par with the existing fees structure of the self-financing UG programmes of the MG University. The prospectus of these two courses will have to be modified accordingly.

2.2. Development of Software for Campus Management System, including .Admission;

The last GB meeting has decided that the Principal should get the Administrative Sanction(AS) and Financial Sanction (FS) from the Director of Collegiate Education before signing the agreement and awarding the contract with the Kerala Electrical & Allied Engineering CO.LTD. The Principal has reported the progress of the implementation of the decision on getting administrative and financial sanction for the development of an integrated software. The Principal pointed out that the office of the DCE had raised some clarifications regarding this matter and he will personally meet the DCE to discuss and get the approval. The GB meeting has entrusted the Principal to get the AS and TS from the DCE for awarding the contract to Kerala Electrical & Allied Engineering CO.LTD for developing the integrated software on campus management system, including the admission module for the academic year 2023-24.


6. Sciene Forum


Environment and Development, (CED), Thiruvananthapuram. The Key Note Address was given by the Resource person and more than 90 members participated in the webinar.







7. Departments

a. Arabic

Allotted faculty strength of the Department is 9. In this academic year the faculty strength was 7.

Two posts remained vacant. One of the faculty members is Associate Professor and others are Assistant Professors. Five faculty members have PhD degree.

RESULT ANALYSIS IV SEMESTER M.A ARABIC 2021-2022

16 students were admitted in 2020 M.A Arabic programme. One of them discontinued the course.

15 students attended the IV semester examination and 14 of them passed out with fairly good grades.

Three students secured A+ grade, eight students secured A grade and three students got grade B+ in

the final result. Overall pass percentage is 93.33. Overall analysis of results shows that students from weaker sections of Other backward communities fared well in the examinations. There was a consistent

progression in the performances of the students right from the first semester.

RESULT ANALYSIS VI SEMESTER UG 2019-22

30 students were admitted in 2019 batch UG and 5 students discontinued the course due to various reasons. Remaining 25 registered for final exam and 21 of them passed out with fairly good grades. 9 students got grade A+, 1 got grade A, 6 got grade B+, and 5 got grade B in the final result. With 4 failures, our result percentage is 84%.

b. Chemistry

The Post Graduate and Research Department of Chemistry, Maharaja's College, Ernakulam started in the year 1935, is one of the largest departments among the colleges in Kerala. Presently the department consists of 171 undergraduate students, 106 post graduate students, 17 research scholars, 20 academic faculty members, 12 research guides, 5 guest lecturers and 5 lab assistants. Starting with a B.Sc course at the time of genesis, the department has grown up as an excellent teaching centre for both undergraduate and postgraduate courses as well as a research centre. The department offers four post graduate courses namely M.Sc Chemistry, M.Sc Pharmaceutical Chemistry, M.Sc Applied Chemistry and M.Sc Analytical Chemistry. A three-year under graduate course in Environment & Water Management was started in 1993 as a vocational course besides the existing degree course in Chemistry.



Annual Report of the Department of English, 2022-23

1. Introduction

The Department of English was established in 1875, coinciding with the birth of Maharaja's College. The college has grown steadily from a second-grade institution affiliated with the University of Madras to a Centre of Excellence over the course of nearly 150 years. Similarly, the department has evolved admirably, initially catering to the needs of various undergraduate programs and the First Arts Course (later renamed the 'Pre-University Course'). In 1956, the department introduced a postgraduate program in English, making it one of the first institutions in Kerala to offer the esteemed master's degree in the subject. Sixteen years later, in 1972, the department expanded its offerings to include an undergraduate program. Following the golden jubilee of its postgraduate program in 2007, the department was elevated to the status of a research centre, granting Ph.D. degrees. Currently, the department comprises 16 teaching faculty members, eleven of whom hold Ph.D.s and actively engage in research in various capacities. Others are either in the process of submitting their theses or have already done so. Notably, the department plays a unique role in reaching all undergraduate students, as English is a mandatory subject at that level.

Members of the department have consistently contributed to the overall growth and performance of the college by serving in central bodies such as the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) committees. Additionally, there are nine supervisors, including retired and external teachers, and more than twenty research scholars currently associated with the department. Over the past five years, the department has produced nine Ph.D. graduates and has seen 35 students successfully clear the National Eligibility Test, seven of whom received Junior Research Fellowships. These achievements bear testimony to the department's commitment to excellence in higher education and research.

2. Admission to UG and PG

Manjusha K.G. served as the department level coordinator for admissions, overseeing both undergraduate (UG) and postgraduate (PG) admissions. Deepthi T. Divakaran was the first year UG tutor. The department admission committee for UG consisted of Rekha Karim,

head of the department, Deepthi T. Divakaran (tutor), Manjusha K.G. (Coordinator), Bijesh V. Jose, and Anoopa C.R. The admission process commenced on August 12th, with specific categories such as arts and sports, while regular admissions began on August 19th, 2022. The admission period concluded on October 31st, 2022. A total of 42 students were admitted, but four of them subsequently withdrew, resulting in an effective strength of 38 students. The admitted students represent diverse categories, with 16 belonging to the State Merit (SM), 5 Scheduled Caste (SC), 2 Scheduled Tribe (ST), 3 Ezhava (EZ), 2 Muslim (MU), 1 Other Backward Hindu (OBH), 3 Economically Weaker Sections (EWS), 1 Latin Catholic (LC), and 2 Sports quota students. Additionally, there were 2 students with disabilities (DA) and 1 student from the Lakshadweep (LD) who were admitted. The Sports Council made 3 admissions specifically for sports-related achievements over and above the sanctioned strength.

Limna P. served as the postgraduate tutor, while the department level admission committee consisted of Rekha Karim (head of the department), Limna P. (tutor), Manjusha K.G. (coordinator), Manchusha Madhusoodanan, and Minu Fathima. The admission process for postgraduate (PG) programs commenced on August 10th, with specific categories for arts and sports, and regular admissions also began on the same date, August 10th, 2022. The admission period concluded on October 7th, 2022. A total of 24 students were admitted, but three of them later withdrew, resulting in an effective strength of 21 students. The allotted seats for PG programs were 22, but a few students were admitted over and above the sanctioned strength, making the total number of admitted students 24. The admitted students represent various categories, including 10 based on State Merit, 2 Ezhavas, 1 Muslim, 1 Other Backward Hindu (OBH), 2 Economically Weaker Sections (EWS), 3 Scheduled Castes, 1 Scheduled Tribe, 1 student through the Sports quota, 1 arts student, and an additional admission over and above the Sports Council's quota. Furthermore, one student was admitted from Lakshadweep.

5. Department meetings

18/10/22

During the meeting, several important agenda items were discussed and decisions were made. It was agreed that the portions of the III UG semester V should be completed within the given timeframe, allowing students enough time for revision. Additionally, preparations for the upcoming Freshers Day on October 27, 2022, were to be made, and clear instructions were to be given to ensure the smooth conduct of the program. The evaluation of UG third semester papers would be completed and returned to the respective tutors by October 21, 2022, with copies of the marklists provided to the parent departments.

Furthermore, teachers were assigned the task of preparing question papers for the upcoming internal exams, specifically for I MA, II MA, and III BA. On October 21, 2022, half-yearly research presentations by the research scholars were scheduled, with the duty of organizing and managing the event assigned to SM. The Head of Department (HoD) and the internal coordinator for the Department Quality Assurance Cell (DQAC) were tasked with counseling and briefing the faculty regarding an internal audit/visit by the DQAC.

Sabitha S. Babu was given the responsibility of submitting a proposal for an upcoming literary fest organized by the ELA. Additionally, it was decided to create a blog to upload reports and photos of department-level activities, with the blog's link to be attached to the college website. This task was assigned to SSB and PKS. The Class Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) of IIIB.A. was to be conducted promptly, with BVJ assigned the duty.

An invited talk by M.V. Narayanan, under the department's OSA, was scheduled to take place. Lastly, the meeting discussed the possibility of allocating an hour to each existing staff member to meet the vacancy requirement caused by RCV's long leave. The responsibility for this task was assigned to MM and SSB.

9/11/22

During the meeting, two important agenda items were discussed. The first item focused on conducting a Communication Skills Training Programme for L.P. school students from the Government Girls School in Ernakulam, as an extension activity. The responsibility for this task was assigned to P.K. Sreekumar. The committee was instructed to prepare lesson plans, schedule classes, and maintain a register of students. It was also suggested to involve more student coordinators from each class to assist in the program's smooth functioning.

The second agenda item involved the preparation of a panel of question paper setters for the final undergraduate (UG) and postgraduate (PG) exams. MM was directed to collaborate with other faculty members in the department to create this panel. The purpose of forming the panel was to ensure the fair and comprehensive setting of question papers for the exams.

By implementing these decisions, the department aimed to provide communication skills training to L.P. school students while also ensuring the effective preparation of question papers for the final UG and PG exams.

5/12/22

During the meeting, two main agenda items were discussed. The first item concerned the synopsis presentation for undergraduate (UG) and postgraduate (PG) students. It was tentatively decided that the presentation would take place on January 16th. This presentation provides an opportunity for students to present a summary of their research work or projects. The second item on the agenda was the Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) meeting for first-year students. It was decided that the meeting would be scheduled for a convenient date in the near future. The PTA meeting serves as a platform for parents and teachers to discuss the progress and well-being of the students.

Additionally, it was agreed upon that the faculty register would be completed by January 10th. This register ensures accurate documentation of the department's faculty members and their relevant details. The meeting also focused on supporting the Kerala Knowledge Mission initiated by the government. The department expressed its commitment to contribute and participate in this mission, which aims to enhance knowledge and education in the state. P.K. Sreekumar and Sabitha S. Babu suggested the introduction of a Moodle program prepared and coordinated by the department members. Moodle is an online learning management system that facilitates course delivery and interaction between teachers and students. Sabitha S. Babu and P.K. Sreekumar were assigned the task of drafting a course curriculum and developing strategies for video uploading as part of the Moodle program. Lastly, the responsibility for the Career to College program was given to the final UG and PG tutors, Bijesh V. Jose and P.K. Sreekumar. This program aims to provide guidance and support to students in their transition from college to their chosen careers.

By making these decisions, the department aimed to ensure the successful completion of synopsis presentations, facilitate effective communication between parents and teachers through PTA meetings, maintain accurate faculty records, actively contribute to the Kerala Knowledge Mission, implement an online learning platform through Moodle, and support students in their career aspirations through the Career to College program.

13/01/2013

The agenda items included the reconstitution of the Board of Studies (BoS) and preparations for an internal audit. The following staff members were present: Rekha Karim, Minu Fathima, Manjusha K.G., P.K. Sreekumar, Bijesh V. Jose, Sabitha S. Babu, Manchusha Madhusudanan, Deepthi T. Divakaran, Anoopa C.R., Limna, Reem, Simi Thomas, and Smitha M. The meeting resulted in several decisions. It was decided to reconstitute the BoS, ensuring an updated and effective structure for the department. The department was also instructed to prepare for an internal audit scheduled for January 18, 2023. To facilitate this, criteria-wise Excel forms were to be updated, and any defects pointed out in the previous audit were to be rectified. Bijesh V. Jose was given the responsibility of verifying the files before the audit.

Another decision made during the meeting was to design an add-on course for the next academic year, either Business English or Functional English, to be conducted for final UG and PG students. Deepthi T. Divakaran was instructed to submit the relevant documents related to the Bridge Course in 2022. To ensure compliance and proper documentation, it was decided that the mentor-mentee diary and tutorial register should be updated before the internal audit. Bijesh V. Jose was assigned the task of updating the mentor register, while Minu Fathima was responsible for the tutorials. Tutors were also advised to maintain class logs and attendance registers systematically.

Furthermore, it was decided that teachers should submit their diaries for verification on Fridays. Leave availed of by the faculty members should be forwarded by the Head of Department (HoD) on Fridays as well. In the absence of RCV, Minu Fathima and Manchusha Madhusudanan were given charge of criteria II and IV, respectively. Lastly, it was agreed upon that research guides from the department should promote the E-content prepared by the research scholars.

03/02/2023

The attendees included Rekha Karim, Priya Jose, Minu Fathima, T.V. Suja, P.K. Sreekumar, Sabitha S. Babu, Manchusha Madhusudanan, Deepthi T. Divakaran, Anoopa C.R., Simi Thomas, and Smitha M. During the meeting, decisions were made on several matters. It was decided that teachers and students should return library books from both the general and department libraries by February 20, 2023. Additionally, the submission of the plan-fund proposal was set to be before March 20.

The proposal for a smart room cum seminar hall was assigned to P.K. Sreekumar for preparation. Furthermore, Manjusha K.G. was appointed as the workshop coordinator for 2023. T.V. Suja suggested a skill enhancement workshop for teachers, focusing on translation, content writing, or editing. She was asked to collaborate with Manjusha K.G. to develop a detailed proposal for the workshop. To enhance IT-enabled teaching strategies, it was proposed to include a purchase proposal for 10 portable projectors, with a cost of Rs. 50,000 each.

Regarding the PG seminar presentations, it was decided to conduct them as soon as possible. For the UG projects, the timeline was set as follows: the first draft due on February 20, the final submission on March 3, and the viva to be conducted from March 15 to 20. Limna P. and Reem S. were chosen as internship coordinators, and the internships were planned for the second semester for PG students. Students would be asked to list three institutions where they proposed to do their internships. The suggested organizations included publishing houses, media companies, news channels, libraries, among others. If possible, long-term Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) would be signed with these organizations.

Manchusha Madhusudanan was assigned the task of preparing the portions for internal exams and paper charges for the courses. Concerns were raised regarding the format of the proposed college journal. The research committee members were entrusted with the responsibility of discussing the concerns with the college coordinator to obtain necessary clarifications.

T.V. Suja reported untidiness in the classrooms, and it was decided to monitor the work of the cleaning staff responsible for maintaining the cleanliness of the classrooms. By addressing these agenda items and making these decisions, the meeting aimed to ensure the timely return of library books, the submission of necessary proposals, the coordination of workshops and internships, the preparation for exams, and the improvement of classroom cleanliness.

8. DQAC

During the academic year 2022-23, the Department Quality Assurance Cell (DQAC) collaborated closely with the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and the English Department to ensure the desired academic quality within the college and the department. To facilitate the process, the teacher's diaries and class log books were collected from the IQAC office on June 2, 2022, and June 10, 2022, respectively, and distributed to the faculty members and main class tutors. At the beginning of the academic year, the necessary documents were prepared and submitted for uploading the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) and National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) details from the English department. The DQAC coordinator actively participated in various meetings convened by the IQAC coordinator on August 11, 2022, September 26, 2022, and September 28, 2022, to discuss important matters.

10. Internal Examinations

The Department of English has implemented a centralized approach for conducting internal exams across all general courses. This streamlined process involves administering two

tests and two retests within a single semester. The evaluation criteria for undergraduate (UG) students are based on a maximum score of 40 marks, while postgraduate (PG) students receive letter grades. These internal exams are designed to resemble miniature versions of the actual exams, providing students with an accurate representation of their knowledge and skills.

To ensure fairness and standardization, all internal exams are subject to the guidelines and directives set forth by the Institutional Level Internal Examination Committee. This committee oversees the development of exam content, sets the marking scheme, and ensures the adherence to academic standards. By centralizing the internal exams, the Department of English aims to maintain consistency and quality in assessing student performance across various courses and levels of study. This approach also facilitates efficient exam administration, resulting in a more organized and effective assessment process for both faculty members and students.

By implementing these measures, the Department of English aims to create an environment where students can demonstrate their understanding and mastery of course material in a controlled and equitable manner. The centralized approach enables the department to monitor and evaluate student progress consistently, allowing for effective feedback and identification of areas that require improvement. Ultimately, this system contributes to the academic growth and development of students pursuing English language and literature studies within the institution.

11. Tutorials

Throughout the academic year 2022-23, the Department of English conducted regular tutorial sessions with the primary objective of improving the overall well-being of the student community. These sessions proved to be a valuable platform for tutors and their tutees, as they met twice every month to engage in productive interactions. 12. Remedial Classes

13. Research Forum

Aim and Purpose of the Research Forum:

The Research Forum aims to cultivate a spirit of research among the students of the Department of English through various engaging activities. Our objective is to provide opportunities for students to interact with scholars and faculty members from prestigious institutions, fostering intellectual discussions and knowledge exchange. Additionally, we organize workshops that equip students with the necessary skills and knowledge to pursue studies in contemporary disciplines. Recognizing the significance of competitive exams such as UGC NET, the Research Forum also focuses on preparing students for these tests. These activities are conducted both online and offline, with events taking place on a monthly basis.

Session 1: 12.08.2022

Research and Academic Writing: Understanding the Basics

Speakers: Abhijith P. & Joyson Jose

The program was organized by the Research Forum on 12.08.2022. Mr Joyson Jose was the resource person, who had an interactive session on project writing with undergraduate and postgraduate students. He explained the various parts of the thesis, right from the synopsis to the conclusion, while asserting the importance of each part that must be systematically organized and be seen as a whole. Joyson had asked the students to come prepared with their final year thesis and abstract. Many of the students had questions about how to write their research proposal and write an argument for their thesis in just two lines.

The second part of the program, understanding basic MLA citation, was done through an interactive session with Mr Abhijith P., a full time research scholar in the department. He began by introducing the Modern Language Association and its necessity to the students. With examples, Abhijith introduced the citation methods for different sources such as books, journals and online articles. The MLA 9th edition format and its various modalities were introduced. Abhijith asked the students to be aware of the differences in the citation methods between MLA 8th and 9th edition. The session was structured to be an interactive session, and he gave small tasks to students on writing a perfect citation through examples that they are familiar with.

Session 2: 14.10.2022

Correlation, Bhakti and Early Modernity in India

Speaker- Umar N

The second session of the Research Scholar's Lecture Series was held on 14.10.2022. The resource person was Dr Umar N, Assistant Professor, Government College for Women, Thiruvananthapuram. Dr Umar had worked on the discipline of Bhakti Studies in India and

explained how the notion of Bhakti has acquired nationalist and authoritarian meanings in the present global context. He also pointed out the background conflict between the Shaivites and the Vaishavaites in the recently released Tamil movie, Ponniyan Selvan. He gave examples from the Hindu literary traditions in South India about geographical and cultural tension that had a history of centuries. This session witnessed interesting discussions on the Adwaita philosophy and the role of women, especially the likes of Meera Bhai in the Bhakti movement. Dr Umar was happy to talk with the faculty of the department and answered queries while stressing the importance of situating Bhakti as a tool of empowerment which institutionalized religion had denied to many people. The session was presided over by the Head of the Department, Dr Rekha Karim and the research coordinator Dr Smitha M.

Session 3: 19.12.2022

Plurality of Memory: A Conceptual Study

Speaker-Lakshmi K. Babu

The third session of the Research Scholar's Lecture Series was held on 19.12.2022. The resource person was Lakshmi K. Babu who is a research scholar in the Department of English, St Xavier's College for Women, Aluva. She began the session by addressing how memory play an important role in our lives, by giving examples from various professions such as law, architecture and politics. The discipline of Memory Studies sees the position of Memory as an agent of political change and positive transformation. Lakshmi introduced the work of Annie Ernoux, who adopts a style of clinical description of memory, giving rise to an in-between genre of novels and traditional memoirs. She also commented upon the works of Svetlana Alexievich, nobel laureate in literature, which focuses on the relationship between memory and trauma in works such as A Chernobyl Prayer, The Unwomanly face of War etc. The session showed good responses from the participants whose questions ranged from situating memory and trauma in the Indian subcontinent to the methodological concerns while undertaking research in Memory Studies. Lakshmi also provided insights into organizations like the Memory Studies Association and the Frankfurt Memory Studies Platform. The session was presided over by the Head of the Department, Dr Rekha Karim and the research coordinator Dr Smitha M.

Session 4: 31.01.2023

Queenship Studies- Past, Present and Future

Speaker- Annie Treesa Joseph

The third session of the Research Scholar Lecture series, Queenship Studies: Past, Present and Future was held offline in the Maharajas College Campus on 31.01.2023. The speaker was Ms Annie Treesa Joseph, a Charles Wallace Fellow and full-time researcher at the Institute of English, University of Kerala. Through examples from popular media, she was

Extension and outreach activities

a) Literari:

To cater for the diverse interests and facilitate in-depth discussions, Literati is divided into two cycles: the Summer Cycle and the Monsoon Cycle. These cycles ensure a continuous flow of engaging content throughout the academic year, fostering a vibrant literary community within the participating colleges. In the 2022-2023 webinar series session, Literati successfully organized and conducted four captivating talks, featuring eminent personalities from the realm of literature. These distinguished speakers brought their expertise, insights, and experiences to the virtual stage, captivating the audience and enriching their understanding of various literary subjects.

The talks covered a wide range of themes and topics, ranging from classic literature to contemporary trends, literary criticism to cultural studies, and everything in between. Each talk was thoughtfully curated to cater to the interests of literature enthusiasts, scholars, and students, fostering a love for literature and encouraging critical thinking within the academic community. The success of the webinar series is a testament to the dedication, hard work, and vision of the students, faculty members, and coordinators involved. It has become a prominent platform for literary enthusiasts to come together, exchange ideas, and explore the vast and fascinating world of literature.

Monsoon Cycle

1) On 28th November 2022, Dr. Sayan Dey, a Postdoctoral Fellow at the WITS Centre for Diversity Studies, University of Witwatersrand, delivered an insightful talk titled 'Transoceanic Culinaryscapes: A Study of the Creole Culinary Connections between India and South Africa. The objective of the seminar was to explore the culinary connections that have emerged between India and South Africa, specifically focusing on the Creole culinary traditions. Dr. Dey aimed to shed light on the historical, cultural, and social factors that have influenced the development of these culinaryscapes.

The speaker also showcased examples of popular Creole dishes, discussing their origins and the cultural meanings attached to them. Dr. Dey concluded the seminar by discussing the implications of his research, including the preservation of culinary heritage, the role of food in shaping cultural identity, and the potential for culinary tourism.

2) On 9th December 2022, Dr. Swetha Antony, an Assistant Professor at the Faculty of Arts, University of Delhi, delivered an engaging seminar titled 'Beyond the Metaphorical of Consumption: A study of the Representation of Food in Contemporary World Poetry.' The objective of the seminar was to explore the representation of food in contemporary world poetry, moving beyond its metaphorical significance and delving into its multifaceted roles as a cultural symbol, source of inspiration, and expression of identity.

Dr. Antony began the seminar by introducing the topic and emphasizing the need to analyze the representation of food in contemporary poetry beyond its metaphorical implications. The presentation delved into the cultural, social, and historical contexts that influence the portrayal of food in poetry, showcasing examples from diverse literary traditions around the world. Dr. Antony highlighted the ways in which poets use food imagery to evoke sensory experiences, trigger memories, and create vivid and visceral connections with readers. The seminar explored the symbolic meanings attached to food in poetry, such as its association with cultural heritage, rituals, social dynamics, and political commentary. Dr. Antony discussed how food acts as a catalyst for exploring themes of identity, nostalgia, desire, power dynamics, and socio-economic issues in contemporary world poetry. The presentation examined the intersection of food, memory, and personal narratives, showcasing how poets use food as a means of self-expression and introspection. Dr. Antony analyzed specific poems and poets, offering critical insights into their use of food imagery, metaphors, and literary techniques to convey nuanced meanings. The seminar concluded with a discussion on the broader implications of studying food in poetry, including its role in cultural preservation, intercultural dialogue, and fostering a deeper understanding of diverse worldviews.

Dr. Swetha Antony's talk provided a thought-provoking exploration of the multifaceted representation of food in poetry. By moving beyond its metaphorical associations, the seminar shed light on the cultural, symbolic, and sensory dimensions of food in contemporary literary expressions. Dr. Antony's analysis of specific poems and poets illuminated the rich tapestry of meanings embedded in food imagery, while emphasizing its role in shaping cultural identities and facilitating intercultural dialogue.

Summer Cycle

The summer cycle of the webinar series was organized in the months spanning between January and March, 2023. It concluded with a total of two lectures. The talks were held by talented resource persons from across India. The platform used for conducting the sessions was Google meet. The sessions were also live-streamed via Facebook. All the webinars were scheduled for 7:00 pm. The sessions were of one hour durations, followed by an engaging interactive session with the resource person. The sessions were attended by students, faculties and other scholars from different institutions.

1.On 24th January 2023, Ms. Kaikasi V.S., Assistant Professor of English at University College, Thiruvananthapuram, delivered an insightful talk titled 'Popular Culture and Literature.' The seminar sought to explore the relationship between popular culture and

literature, examining how popular culture influences literary works and the ways in which literature reflects and engages with the popular culture of its time.

The seminar illuminated the ways in which popular culture influences and interacts with literature, shedding light on the various ways authors engage with and respond to contemporary cultural phenomena. By analysing specific examples and discussing the challenges and opportunities presented by this relationship, the seminar deepened our understanding of the intricate connections between popular culture and literature. This seminar contributes to the field of literary studies, encouraging further exploration and critical examination of the impact of popular culture on literary works and vice versa.

2. On 2nd March 2023, Dr. Rangarajan Gopalakrishnan, former Professor and Head of the Department of English at Maharaja's College, Ernakulam, conducted an enlightening seminar on the topic of 'Hard/Soft skills: Capacity building for engaging an audience.' The objective of the seminar was to explore the importance of both hard and soft skills in effectively engaging an audience. Dr. Gopalakrishnan aimed to provide insights and strategies for capacity building in order to enhance audience engagement in various professional and personal contexts.

Dr. Gopalakrishnan commenced the seminar by introducing the topic and highlighting the significance of both hard and soft skills in communication and audience engagement. This seminar contributes to the field of communication studies and professional development, empowering participants to become more skilled and engaging communicators in their respective fields.

b) School Teaching

The Department of English organised a series of interactive sessions aimed at students of classes 1 to 4 at Government Lower Primary School, Ernakulam. These sessions, scheduled for 10 days, took on the following dates: November 18th and 25th, December 9th, 16th and 23rd (2022), January 6th and 20th, and February 2nd and 24th in the year 2023. The objective of these sessions is to provide valuable learning experiences and enhance the English language skills of the students. The resource group, consisting of students and teachers from the Department of English actively engaged with the young learners, fostering an environment of collaboration and knowledge-sharing. Through this initiative, we aimed to inspire a love for English language, promoting a lifelong passion for learning.

In our program, we adopted the principles of cognitive constructivism as a foundation for our teaching methods. We emphasized embedded learning, which involves integrating new knowledge into the students' existing understanding to promote meaningful learning experiences. To facilitate this, we created lifelike situations where students could apply their language skills in practical contexts, enhancing their comprehension and communication abilities. We also encouraged free interaction among students, fostering a supportive and collaborative learning environment. Additionally, we prepared supplementary materials to complement the curriculum and provided additional resources for the students' learning journey. By incorporating these methods, we sought to create an engaging and

effective learning environment that promotes active participation and deeper understanding of the English language.

The program covered various areas and items essential for developing English language proficiency. We focussed on teaching students how to express their wishes and greetings to others, enabling them to communicate effectively in social settings. Additionally, we guided them in introducing themselves confidently, allowing them to establish connections and initiate conversations. Describing simple objects and familiar situations was another crucial aspect we covered, helping students expand their vocabulary and express themselves accurately. We also delved into kinship terms, enabling students to talk about their family members and relationships. Storytelling exercises were meant to foster creativity and language skills as students learn to craft narratives. The program also emphasized assembling narratives from hints, honing their comprehension and critical thinking abilities. Reading and speaking activities were offered with a view to enhancing both their reading comprehension and oral communication skills. Lastly, role-play exercises provided students with opportunities to practice English in simulated real-life situations. Through these comprehensive areas and items, we aim to equip students with the necessary language skills to confidently navigate everyday conversations and express themselves fluently in English.

We appreciate the valuable feedback and suggestions provided to enhance our program. To address the need for more time and resources, we will allocate additional time for each session and consider involving more personnel to ensure effective implementation. Integration of ICT (Information and Communication Technology) will be a priority to leverage digital tools and resources, making the learning experience more engaging and interactive. We acknowledge the effectiveness of group-based activities and will emphasize their incorporation into the program, as they foster collaboration, communication, and peer learning. Ensuring continuity is crucial, and we will establish a structured framework that promotes regular sessions to maintain progress and build upon previous learning. Furthermore, we will expand the scope by creating wider situations, enabling students to apply their language skills in diverse and realistic contexts. With these improvements, we strive to create a dynamic and inclusive learning environment that maximizes student engagement and language acquisition.

PTA meetings

a) The III B.A. class Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) meeting was conducted on October 2022 at 7 PM through the virtual platform of Google Meet. The meeting served as an important platform for communication and collaboration between the parents and teachers involved in the students' academic journey. A total of 25 parents actively participated in the PTA meeting, alongside 15 teachers who were present to address the concerns and queries raised by the parents. The meeting focused on discussing the scholastic and academic progress

of the students, aiming to provide a comprehensive understanding of their overall development.

During the PTA meeting, both parents and teachers were given an opportunity to share their thoughts, concerns, and suggestions regarding the students' academic performance. The teachers, equipped with their expertise and experience, responded to the questions raised by parents, providing valuable insights and guidance. One of the key aspects emphasized by the teachers during the meeting was the importance of higher education and its role in enhancing the students' employability. They highlighted the need for continuous learning and acquiring relevant skills that would equip the students to succeed in their future careers. The PTA meeting served as a platform for the teachers to discuss strategies and initiatives aimed at improving the students' academic performance. They shared innovative teaching methodologies, study techniques, and resources that could be beneficial to the students' learning journey. The interactive and collaborative nature of the PTA meeting fostered a strong partnership between the parents and teachers, ensuring that both parties were actively involved in the students' educational growth. The meeting concluded with a renewed commitment from all stakeholders to work together to provide the best possible education and support for the III B.A. class students.

Hunger Free Campus

The Hunger Free Campus program, initiated by the government of Kerala, was implemented with the aim of ensuring that college students do not suffer from a lack of midday meals. The program was effectively overseen by the department, with Anoopa C.R. serving as the teacher coordinator. The program spanned the last three months of the academic year, during which a total of 516 food packets were distributed among the students. Each food packet was priced at Rs. 40. To make the meals affordable for the students, the government provided a subsidy, covering 75% of the cost. The remaining amount, ten rupees per packet, was funded by the department.

The Hunger Free Campus program was met with great success, ensuring that students had access to nutritious meals during their college hours. This initiative aimed to alleviate the financial burden on students and promote their overall well-being. Looking ahead, preparations for the upcoming year's program have already been completed, with the necessary arrangements made to continue providing midday meals to college students. The students have been intimated about the continuation of the program, assuring them of consistent support in combating hunger on campus. The program stands as a testament to the government's commitment to the welfare of college students, addressing their basic needs and enabling them to focus on their education without hunger-related challenges. By prioritizing the provision of midday meals, the program not only supports the students' physical health but also contributes to their academic success and overall development.

f. Geology

As part of MSc Geology programme, the department has continued to be actively involved in a variety of endeavors to foster geology among the younger generation also to develop passion for Earth Science. Syllabus has been revised the basis of program specific outcome pattern. From 13/10/22 to 15/10/22, II sem geology students went for a field study programme as a part of their curriculum. The filed study covering areas of Kollam and Varkalai of Thiruvananthapuram district also had done institutional visit in IREL kollam and NCESS Thiruvananthapuram. Unlike last year, first year practical exam was conducted in the department itself. Last year practical exam was conducted in Christ College, Irinjalakuda, Thrissur due to limited lab facilities in our department. Parent Teachers meeting of the I& II sem students has been conducted on 01/12/22. Main agenda was to discuss the results of the students, also to get feedback from the parents regarding the course. A good feedback was obtained from the parents. IV sem students were selected in CUSAT, School of Marine Science Campus, Kochi and Government college Kottayam, Nattakom, for completing their academic project to fulfill the curriculum.

g. Hindi

PG & Research Department of Hindi, Maharaja's College is an esteemed one in Kerala. Hence the Govt. of Kerala has declared the Department as Centre of Excellence. The Department provides both U.G. and P.G Courses in Hindi. Faculties in Hindi Department for the year 2022-2023 are

In the Academic Year 2022-2023 our Students status were, 122 students in UG and 45 students in PG and almost 425 students from other departments selected Hindi as additional language. BA Hindi Syllabus was restructured on 27th November 2019 and the Department has implemented the re-structured syllabus from 2020 UG Admission. MA Hindi was restructured in 2022, and implemented the same from this academic year. Internal assessment is conducted through 2 Test Papers and Seminars, Internal and external Viva-voce examinations are conducted in the final semesters after the examinations. During syllabus revision, the Dept. of Hindi has implemented various remedial measures to improve the result

of both PG & UG courses. We conducted PTA Meetings for each class. Overall performance of the students has been rated good.

Eight rooms are allotted to Dept of Hindi. This include HOD Room, Staff Room, Two Classes for PG - II MA (No. 38), I MA (No. 39), Three classes for UG-III BA (No. 106), II BA (No. 102) I BA (No. 40). Among these, Room No. 40 is a smart class room with Smart Board and LCD. Projector. One room has also been allotted for Research scholars. Department of Hindi, Maharajas' College is one of the leading centres of research in Hindi, in South India. It has produced 25 Ph.Ds' so far. At present, there are twelve Supervising Guides. 52 Research Scholars are engaged in this department at different levels of their research work, among them 12 are part time scholars and 40 are full-time research scholars. Among the 14 supervising guides, seven are from the Hindi department of the College.

In the Academic Year 2022-2023, one research scholar had completed the Presubmission Seminar through Online mode. Every year the Department organizes various programmes to promote research activities. The 'Premchand Jayanthi' is celebrated by the Department every year. Dr. Radhamani. C and Dr. Anjali. S were the coordinators for this year's Premchand Jayanthi Samaroh. Hindi Professor (Dr.) K. Sreelatha, HoD of Hindi, Sree Sankaracharya Sanskrit University was the resource person. Even though the department had made all the arrangement for an offline lecture commemorating the contributions of Premchand to the Indian literature, it was conducted through online mode due to the unexpected declaration of holiday by the District Collector. A Hand written magazine based on the works of Premchand was released in which many of our UG/PG students and research scholars had expressed their views on Premchand Sahithy. Poster exhibition based on the life and works of Premchand was another contribution by our students. The Department of Hindi celebrated Azadi ka Amrut Mahotsav on 26 January. Dr Deepak K.R, Assistant Professor, Dept. of Hindi, Kerala University was the key-note speaker for the session, on the topic -" Rashtr Nirman Mein Hindi Bhasha Aur Sahithy ki Bhoomika". Dr Anjali S was the Co Ordinator of the programme.

Hindi Pakhwada (Hindi Fortnight) was celebrated with varieties of academic sessions and programs by the Dept. of Hindi. The Hindi Day was Inaugurated by Prof. (Dr.) K. Vanaja, former Head and Dean of faculties, CUSAT. She has presented a detailed analysis of the Booker International Prize winning novel "RET SAMADHI" (Tomb of Sand) by the famous Hindi author Geetanjali Sree for the entire college community. Various literary competitions were conducted for the students of the college as a part of the Hindi fortnight celebrations. Ms. Sruthi K.S co-ordinated the programme as a whole, while Dr. Saji R Kurup had Coordinated the Three days National Seminar on the topic "BhaneeshwarNath Renu-Aaj", which was organized from 28-30th September 2022 in association with 'Bharateeya Sahithya Pratishtan'- an academic, literary and cultural organization based in Cochin. Dr Rakesh 'Renu'- Eminent writer, critic and the Chief Editor of the famous Hindi journal "Aaj Kal" was the special guest for the Seminar. Nearly 50 research papers were presented by

eminent academicians, scholars and students in different sessions. By the concluding session

of the 3 days seminar, the Hindi Fortnight celebrations came to an end. Students who performed well in the different competitions organized as a part of this celebrations were also appreciated in the validitory function.

Women's day was celebrated by the Dept. with a thought provoking and interesting lecture by Dr. Silvykutty, writer and retired Associate Professor of Malayalam, Maharaja's College, Ernakulam. Ms. Sruthy K.S was the Co ordinator. Bridge course was conducted after the completion of of UG admission. The objective of the 30 hours bridge course programme is to familiarise the newly admitted students to the curriculum and to the college. Ms Shruti. K.S, tutor of 1st Semester BA co-ordinated the programme.

Student's Outreach Programme was introduced in collaboration with the Government Girl's Higher Secondary School, Ernakulam this year, with the objective of bringing the academic excellence of the students to the common people of the society. Research scholars of the Department regularly visited the GGHSS and engaged extra classes for the students of the school, free of cost. Remedial classes for the students who find Hindi difficult was the main advantage of these sessions. Dedication and commitment of our research scholars were much appreciated by the school authorities. Dr Radhamani C was the Co ordinator of the Programme.

Value added course on "Translation and Communicative Hindi" was introduced by the Department of Hindi in this academic year. Students who aspire to be a translator were benefitted by the course. Dr Sindhu G Nair was the co ordinator of the Value added Course; all other faculty members engaged equal number of sessions in the 30 hrs programme. NET Coaching & Remedial Coaching classes also were conducted regularly by the faculties of the department. Dr Anitha P. L and Dr. Jayaprabha C.S were the co-ordinators of these programmes.

Research Scholar's Lecture Series was re-introduced by the Department of Hindi this year. It is organized every month with an intention of providing an opportunity to our research scholars to present their research findings as well as to get introduced to various topics. Dr. M. G. Bindu, Research co-ordinator of the Dept. took initiative for this programme. Hindi Department maintains a beautiful garden in the backyard of the college; which bagged the 3rd position in the garden making competition conducted by the "BHUMITRASENA" for the college. Efforts of Dr. Reenakumari. V. L, Department Coordinator of Bhumitrasena is highly appreciated in this context.

The Department of Hindi has signed an MoU with Bharateey Sahithya Pratishthan, a Kochi based academic, cultural and literary organization. In the coming years we are planning to conduct workshops, seminars and discussions utilizing the resource provided by this organization.

Three of our students – Ms. Amala Thomas, Ms. Telma Titus (Research Scholars) & Ms. Rameesa. C. U. (MA Hindi student 2020-22 batch) qualified the NET in the year 2023. Abdul Bazith, MA Hindi student of 2020-22 batch got selection in the IPL Rajasthan Royals Cricket team. We appreciate our students for their achievements both in Arts and Sports. 2 top scoring students of MA Hindi- 2020-22 batch Ms. Lakshmi K S & Ms Rameesa C. U were felicitated by the 'Rajbhasha Samman' by UCO Bank Cochin Regional office. Department is

doing translation of various documents as an extension activity charging only a nominal amount of Rs 300/- which is utilized for the miscellaneous expenditures of the Department, which can be considered as a service to the public.

In the academic year 2022-23, Internship for PG students was introduced for the first time. As Official Language implementation policy of the Central Government provides the maximum job opportunities for the UG & PG students of the Hindi Department, 18 students were provided internship opportunities in the Central government institutions/ undertakings like Central Marine Fisheries Research Institute (CMFRI- 5students), Coconut Board (6 students), Cochin Shipyard (3), BSNL(4). 4 students who aspire for a career in the field of Journalism are undergoing training in the Janmabhoomi Press, Kaloor. The Department is planning to include the internship programme as a PG syllabus which was revised last year, so that our students can be provided a minimum fund to meet expenses for the period of internship. Faculty members and research scholars have been publishing their valuable thinking and research findings in many leading and peer reviewed journals.

The Department of Hindi is planning to start more value added courses like translation practice, Communication skills in Hindi which will enhance the employability of students. Discussions are going on for the launching of a registered Alumni association of the Department of Hindi.





The Board of Studies met twice during the academic year to discuss important matters related to syllabus and Valuation. A panel has been submitted to the Academic Council to reconstitute the Board of Studies. The Department collected feedback related to the curriculum and syllabus, from students using google form.

Report of Inauguration of Physical Literacy Awareness Program organized by Department of Physical Education Maharajas College Ernakulam




Physical Literacy Awareness Program

4. MG UNIVERSITY INTERCOLLEGIATE HOCKEY 5'SCHAMPIONSHIP



Report of Inauguration of Physical Literacy Awareness Program organized by Department of Physical Education Maharajas College Ernakulam




Physical Literacy Awareness Program




National Seminar organized in observance of World Human Rights Day


Invited Lecture organized in observance of National Constitutional Day


A WORKSHOP IN COLLOBORATION WITH CPPR

Academic Planning

The Academic Council , The IQAC , The internal examination Committee and the Controller of Examinations organized a meeting before the commencement of the Academic year to draft an action plan for the current Academic year. As per their instructions Sanskrit Department have organized a faculty meeting on June 2022 at Sanskrit H.O.D Room. The Syllabus and present semester Time table were discussed and finalised. Name of each Class Tutors , Co-Class Tutors and Second Language Tutors were fixed. The Schedules for the B.O.S, time bound Conducting of Internal Assessment work (Assignment, Seminars, Class test) other Departmental Co-curricular, extra curricular activities and programmes are also planned Review of Teaching -Learning Process

The Department reviews the teaching-learning process, structures, and methodologies of operation and learning outcomes at periodic intervals. At the end of every semester, the teacher collects feedback from students for self-improvement. After the publication of the result of semester exams, the result is analysed in Department and corrective measures are executed for the betterment of the result. After the end Semester, examination feedback is collected from students about the curriculum, attainment of graduate attributes. Department-level induction/orientation programmes were arranged for newly joined students.

A new timetable is prepared for online classes in compliance with the master time table considering the time restriction suggested by the DCE. For the smooth conduct of online classes, the College provided official mail id. for all the faculty members and students. The UG syllabus revision was completed incorporating the suggestions from all the stakeholders and implemented in the 2022-23 academic year. A new course related to the environment is introduced in all the UG programmes. All the first-year UG students were enrolled in the Swayam Portal .The SQAC was formed, nominating the toppers in each class of the department for assuring the quality of the students in academic and non-academic matters. The tutorial system and Mentoring system were also taken up to help students in various ways. With the help of various committees and organizations, needy students were equipped to cope with the online classes.

With the help of the Jeevani centre all measures were taken to monitor the mental health of all students and provided counselling support to students in need. In the wake of the Pandemic Situation, all measures were taken to strengthen the tutorial system and Mentoring System. Remedial Teaching is imparted to weaker students based on the result analysis report. Applying Scientific Methods Slow and Advanced Learners were identified and special

programmes were arranged for all category students.

Initiatives in managing the online teaching-learning Process

The institution has an e-learning platform-Moodle, which enabled the teachers to share their e-resources with students. Teachers are also using Google meet for conducting online classes. Teachers and students are encouraged to attend MOOC courses offered through Swayam. IQAC of Maharaja's College organized a seven-day training programme on Moodle LMS as part of the implementation of LMS and all faculties attended the same . The Cell organized a training programme on e-Content Development for all faculty members. With the help of the Website Committee, the College issued an N-list password for all students to Access N-list E-library. Making use of different online platforms like g-suite, MOODLE, etc. All the faculty members effectively handled the leaching learning and evaluation activities.

Internal Examination

Internal Examinations for all UG and PG Classes (odd and even semesters) conducted as per the Academic Calender and order of Internal Exam Committee. Department Class rooms were used as exam hall and Faculties have done the invigilation duty as per the Time Table Hours and Valuation have done accordingly and results were published and informed to students.

Research Activities

The Sanskrit Department is recognized as the Research Department from 1991.

Two teachers were recognized as Research guides. 4 research Scholars enrolled in Department, One Research Scholar enrolled during this Academic year. All research scholars presented their research progress and the live streaming of these events arranged using the newly purchased live streaming studio. A publication wall has been arranged in the College to exhibit the publication of teachers and students. The Research committee organized Course work classes through an online platform.

As a part of Department Auditing procedure on Academic and Non Academic Activity ,we have been arranging Seven Criterion vice documents as follows

Criterion 1

Hard Copy of Syllabus in UG & PG programmes have been maintained in department which includes Syllabus revision done in 2016, 2019, &2020 . We have conducted Department Board of Studies meeting both internal and external and a register including Minutes of Board of Studies (2 meetings per year) kept in department. All department faculties have been included as members of B.O.S. Mo Us with relevant organizations ,till 2022 December we are not having any Mo Us, From 2023 onwards we are planning to sign Mo Us with SSUS Kalady. Syllabus of Value added Course – Department conducted value added course on Yoga with a specified structured syllabus with Brochure of Value added Course , and list of Students enrolled for Value Added Course . We also keeping Attendance record of the students attending the value added course. Department is giving Project work for final UG and PG students based on concern syllabus and keeping List of students undertaking student projects with proof (certificate).

CRITERION - II

Criterion II includes Admission register, Bio data of Students, with list of students admitted against reserved categories. After first UG regular class starting, department conducted bridge course with syllabus and after regular teaching hours faculties conduct special coaching and based on it we conduct one hour exam, and done evaluation and as per

evaluation report we categorise students as Slow learners and fast learners and conducted remedial programmes for slow learners. Result Analysis Report also made ready after end Semester exams. Documents for Student centric methods are adopted in this session, Name and list of ICT-enabled tools including online resources are kept on register. From the admitted students list ,all faculties has been assigned with 10 or less than 10 students as Mentor –Mentee. Circular with regard to assigning mentors and mentees Mentor's Diary are documented. Teaching Plan of 22-23 Seat matrix of UG and PG programme for the academic year 22-23, Teacher's diary22-23, Students Class Log book 22- 23, Attendance register , Time table - odd and even semesters 22-23 etc... with necessary Geo tagged Photos are documented. Criterion III

We were unable to conduct best practice like food fest , Job fair etc. and documentation should be done according to title, objective, context, practice, evidence of success.

r. Statistics

History

The Department of Statistics came into existence in Maharaja's College, Ernakulam during **1975** by converting two posts of Lecturers in Mathematics. In June 1976, Sri B. Devadas and Sri K. J. Justin George Francis were appointed as Lecturers in Statistics by the Govt. of Kerala. Later, another post was created as per the workload of the Department. From 1975 to 1987, Statistics teachers were working under the Dept. of Mathematics. In June 1987, the Dept. of Statistics was bifurcated and emerged as an independent one.

The P. G. Course in Statistics came into prominence in **1995** with Prof. Justin George Francis as the Head of the Department and Smt. T. M. Marykutty and Dr. S. Santhosh as Faculty members. In the same academic year, 5 more Lecturer posts were sanctioned and hence the Faculty was enhanced to 8 with the inclusion of Sri K. A. Rajeevan Pillai, Smt. R. Thankam, Sri T. V. Francy and Dr. N. Hitha as Faculty members. In June 1998, Prof. M. Sreekumar joined the Faculty as HOD. With the collective and sincere efforts of teachers, students and well- wishers of the Dept., it has risen to soaring heights beyond anyone's imagination.

Course offered

Department of Statistics, Maharajas College Ernakulam is offering a full time post graduate course in Statistics and Ph.D. in Statistics. Right from the inception of a Post-Graduation course in Statistics in 1995, the department has been successful in attracting bright students to pursue learning and career in Statistics. The department has been flying on the wings of talented and committed faculty members. The department is functioning in a separate block with well-equipped lab and library.

The department has been successful in producing excellent results for PG program. The department regularly conducts enrichment programs to equip students to pursue better heights in education and career. Many of our students are well placed in both private and government sectors.

Enrichment lecture series, seminars, workshop and activities of Statistics club etc. all add laurel to the functioning of the department. The faculty members are research oriented as evidenced by the number of publications in reputed referred journals.

Facilities of the Department

Smart Class Room and Computer Lab

In order to implement ICT facilities in the department, one of the class rooms has been converted into a Smart Class room. We have well equipped computer lab with 25 computers, wifi and high speed internet facility. Licensed softwares like SPSS, MATLAB, R, PYTHON, EVIEWS, and MS OFFICE are made use of. The P.G. students do their practicals using SAS, MATLAB, PYTHON, R and M.S. Excel.




