1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

The IQAC of the College takes feedback from students, teachers, alumni and parents. The feedback in 2019-20 was collected using Google Forms. In order to ensure full transparency and fairness, the online form was designed to be filled-in anonymously and without any bias by the participants. A total number of one hundred sixty four teachers responded to the survey. The responses to the questions were collected on a five point scale. Eighty three percent of the teaching faculty strongly agrees that prior notice is given for the BoS meetings while another twelve percent expressed satisfaction. 93 of the teachers expressed their satisfaction towards the coverage and incorporation of relevant aspects in the syllabus. Ninety four percent of the teachers expressed their satisfaction over the curricular objectives. 93 respondents said that the

curriculum of the college possess ample scope for theoretical and practical learning. 93 respondents said that the curriculum of the college possess ample scope for theoretical and practical learning. Altogether a majority of 94 of the teachers expressed their satisfaction towards appropriateness in the selection of elective courses. 93 expressed their satisfaction regarding the achievement of learning outcomes in the College. More than 90 of the respondents opined that the process of curriculum development in the College is appropriate. 92 of the faculty are in agreement that the syllabus covers latest theoretical developments. Around 91 of the teachers agreed that there is good coverage of emerging issues in the syllabus. A majority of around 93 expressed their satisfaction towards the appropriateness of the reading list and references. Around 88 of the respondents agree to the aspect that the reading list of reference books and materials are available for the student community in the College. More than 90 of the respondents expressed their satisfaction regarding the appropriateness of the periodic revision and updating process of the syllabus. More than ninety percent of the respondents expressed their satisfaction towards the appropriateness in the allocation of contact hours. Around forty five percent said that they are able to do the time management in syllabus completion though under stress, while only twenty eight percent responded that they are able to manage time effectively. In the feedback of parents, around eighty eight percent of the respondents expressed their satisfaction regarding the curriculum and syllabus of the college. Sixty four percentage marked strong agreement whereas another twenty four percent marked agreement in this regard. A total number of four hundred twenty eight alumnus responded to the survey. Around forty nine percent of the respondents strongly agreed that curriculum and syllabus are appropriate while thirty percent are in agreement with the same. After analysing the feedbacks, department were given directions to discuss in detail the issues pertaining and to submit a detailed report with suggestions. The IQAC submitted recommendations before the college council on the basis of wider discussions among the IQAC members and the consolidated suggestions from respective departments. The recommendations were accepted by the council and decided to implement the same.

Every Tutor Collects Key Information Of A Student In Terms Of His Or Her Social Background, Education Of Parents, Financial Status, Academic Preferences, Scholastic Difficulties Faced So Far, And Possible Areas Of Higher Education And Chances Of Immediate Employment. The Tutor Interacts With The Wards Individually Or Collectively For Identifying Their Strengths And Weaknesses Whereby The Tutor Eventually Recommends And Executes Appropriate Measures Like Remedial Classes And Personalized Counselling. In The Case Of Students Who Display A Flair For Academic Mobility And Original Research, The Tutor Informs Them About Activities Such As Seminars, Workshops And Colloquia, And Positively Inspires Them To Participate. Students Are Encouraged And Motivated To Browse The Internet, The Library And EJournals For Academic Activities Such As Assignments And Intramural Projects. The Process Thus Enhances Their SelfReliance, Research Aptitude, Communication Skills And Confidence. Such Interventions And Scaffolding Help The Students Develop A Filial Affection For The Teacher. Being Thoroughly Receptive Of The Polarity In Learning Abilities Of The Students, The Institution Has Taken Special Care In Identifying The Students Who Display Various Levels Of Cognition Under Major Categories Like Slow Learners And Advanced Learners. • Slow Learners: Students Facing Problems In Cognising The Complex Concepts In The Curriculum Tend To Develop Ineptness In Learning, Such Students Are Rendered Special Care Under The Initiative Of Scholar Support Programme. The college has a comprehensive and inclusive code of procedure and policy

position for the optimal utilization and effective maintenance of facilities such as laboratories, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms, auditoria, seminar halls and intellectual resources offered by the 182 strong teaching faculty as well as services offered by the administrative office. While laboratories, library and computers (including the internet) are primarily meant for students, teachers and nonteaching staff of the college, the first two can be accessed by external researchers, enthusiasts and general public after obtaining the prior written permission of the principal. In the case of research scholars from other universities, colleges and institutions a letter of recommendation duly signed by the research supervisor or the head of the institution/department is mandatory. The sports complex which includes a state-of-the-art synthetic track and a health fitness centre is widely used for the conduct of various sport events and athletic meets at state and national levels. Nearby sports academies and aspiring athletes regularly make use of the wide spectrum of facilities and amenities offered by the college. In addition, there is regular coaching for taekwondo and fitness training for candidates trying to join armed forces and police. There is an internal committee, headed by the principal and comprising members from the teaching staff, to monitor and ensure transparency and safety in matters relating to the sports complex. The college has one auditorium, four seminar halls and three gallery classrooms with permanent power, acoustic systems, projection facilities and extensive seating capacity. The auditorium is rented to public organizations, strictly following the terms and conditions laid out by the college. Other spaces are meant for the departments and internal organizations to conduct academic/cultural programs. The department/organization which needs a space has to book the same well in advance with the principal through a written request or with the person designated by him/her. There is a room allotment committee headed by a senior teacher which ensures fair and equitable distribution of classroom. Smart classrooms are used by a batch after getting permission from the head of the department concerned.

The Students' College Union election was held on August 21, 2019. After the oath taking ceremony presided over by the returning officer Dr. Jolly V. Antony, the newly elected union took their office charges on the second of September, 2019 under the leadership of chair person Divya V.G. In the first meeting with the Principal, a new initiative of the union to enlarge its number by including representatives from transgenders, Sports and Research scholars was launched. Thus Daya Gayathri became the first transgender representative, Althaf K.N., the Sports representative and Shelley, the Research Scholars representative. The first programme of the College Union was the colourful Onam Celebration on the 5th of Septemebr, 2019 with variety programmes like pulikkali, kaikottikali, dress code competition etc clubbed with Teachers' day celebration by honouring Principal, Vice principal, Rohini teacher and Staff Advisor. On the 20th of September, 2019 the college union in collaboration with the Department of Malayalam, organized a seminar "Vakkukal Kondulla Prathishedham" (Dissent using Words) which was inaugurated the versatile

veteran dignitary, Prof. M.K. Sanu. Sessions on "Mathrubhaasha- desheeyathayum upadesheeyathayum by M.R. Surendran Library Council District Secretary and M. Swaraj M.L.A. in the AN "Janaadhipathyavum fascisavum" by M. Swaraj, M.L.A. followed. On September 25, 2019, Creative Writing Club was inaugurated by the renowned Malayalam poet S. Joseph, who is also our Head of the Department of Malayalam. On September 27, 2019, Theatre club and Mirror film club inauguration was done by Dr. Indu Velsar.On December 11,12 and 13 of 2019 Arts Day "Thottakkam" was conducted in which various stage item competitions were organised. . Competitions were conducted in five stages. The main stage was arangu in centre circle named as BPCL. The other stages were English Main Hall, Malayalam Hall, Chemistry gallery and Zoology gallery. They were named as Air India, Indian Railway, Cochin Ship Yard and BSNL. The requiem sung for the public sector privatization got media attention and news in various newspapers and news channels. In collaboration with the Women Cell of the College, the Union devoted a day for the transgender friends of our campus. The event titled "Pride Maharajas" was made more meaningful by the Dwaya group who performed ramp show and a play portraying the everyday touching lives of the transgenders, "Parayaan Maranna Kadhakal". 7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

Students themselves engage in cleaning the campus and removing waste from the campus. The students prepared cardboard pen boxes and installed at the staff room and classrooms, office rooms and other college premises. Disposal of waste in the source- The accumulated waste is segregated into green and non-green. Biowaste is converted into biogas that is used in the college canteen and slurry is used for vegetable cultivation. Popularize plastic-free campaign and execute the policy by introducing the use of sustainable materials. Popularise the use of bicycles among the staff and students. Introduced Wick Irrigation Technology that requires water refilling once in 10 days which is very convenient for vegetable cultivation in educational institutions. A vegetable garden with 5 different vegetable was set up with wick irrigation in the campus.

7.2 - Best Practices

7.2.1 - Describe at least two institutional best practices

Best Practice 1 Gender Specific Programmes The gender specific programmes of Maharaja's College envision a holistic gender specific approach in education and campus community life. The campus has always been to the fore in following an inclusive approach to address the needs of the students from the excluded and the disadvantaged communities irrespective of sex, color, cast and wealth. Objectives: • To promote gender specific approach and gender equity in all walks of campus life. • To prepare ground for voicing the issues of students from transgender community and address their basic needs. • To introduce gender empowerment programme with the primary emphasis to transgender community. • To enhance the safety and wellbeing of the transgender community in the college.

The Context: Maharaja's college is on track to develop gender specific approach among the campus fraternity so that a young generation can be brought up without any stigmas of discrimination based on the gender or sex of an individual. Mahraja's college can proudly claim as the first college in Kerala to welcome the transgender students. In all institutions, the transgender community face stigmas and discrimination. The antagonistic attitude of the society forces the transgender to discontinue their education resulting in high dropout ratio. The college, in view of shortage of their attendance in classes, initiated to identify their key issues and to bring them back to education and extra-curricular activities. The Practice 1. Awareness talks: Women Cell in the college organises awareness programes and lecture sessions to spark on the ways to attain gender empowerment in the society. It prepared a platform for expressing grievances and unpleasant experiences that transgender students encounter in the society. The transgender students addressed the students of 18 departments separately under the auspices of Women Cell. These programmes served as an eye opener to students, teachers and staff to acquaint with the hard realities of their life. 2. Lecture series: A series of lectures were organised to orient the campus community make the college a comfortable hub for them. 3. International Transgender Day Celebrations: The 20th of November was made memorable by honouring victims, celebrating transgender success and raising awareness of worldwide discrimination faced by them 4. Seminar: A National Seminar was organized to bring in diverse people and different issues among the transgender community to a common platform. With the enthusiastic participation of NGOs and activists, the seminar discussed issues related to human rights, law, social exclusion etc. and suggest ways to redress these issues. 5. International Transgender Day Celebrations: The 20th of November was made memorable by honouring victims, celebrating transgender success and raising awareness of worldwide discrimination faced by them. 6. Women Cell decided to celebrate a particular day in the academic year exclusively of transgender community. 7. Staff and all student functionaries celebrated International Women's day by organising Rallies, exhibitions and discussions on March 8th 2021 Evidence of Success 1. The continuing discussions could a great extent help to inculcate an gender neutral approach among the campus community. The community became aware of removing the social stigmas imposed on the transgender community. 2. Generally, the financial background of transgender students is poor and they struggle to meet means of livelihood and coerced to discontinue their courses. In this context, Women Cell under the sponsorship of some teacher offered lunch to these students in free of cost with the intention to sustain them in the campus life. 3. Maharajas under the auspices of Women Cell, Student Union and Dhwayah (Transgender Movement) opened its doors to conduct a cultural programme exclusively of transgenders under the banner Pride Maharaja's during the month of January 2020. They performed dances, songs, skit, fashion show, etc. and captured the entire audience. Preparatory work to Pride Maharajas raised their interaction with the campus and elevated their status. 4. Using PTA fund, the college constructed unigender toilet block and it was a novel concept in campus life of Kerala and it greatly helped to inculcate the spirit of gender neutrality. Best Practice 2 Student for Change: Capabilities to Community Empowerment- Students with immense capabilities look for change and they can be put to the benefits of the society. Our college missions to explore the capabilities of student force for empowering the society for change. Objectives: 1. To nurture the holistic development of students by exploring their capabilities and actively involving in community services for the progress of the disadvantaged and underprivileged sections. 2. To develop eco-friendly attitude among students for preserving natural resources and clean environment. 3. To empower the local community by improving quality of their life forging change 4. To educate the community to lead clean and plastic free life and 'avoid unsustainable practices'. 5. To cultivate a

sense of compassion to the disabled. Context Maharaja's college imbibes the

spirit of expressing opinions and extend whole-hearted support in all endeavours that lead to empowerment and change. The holistic development of a student is incomplete so long as he or she keeps away from the society. The students hailing from nuclear families of diverse background seldom get opportunities to acquaint with the real world and the society. Maharajas College, a hub of students from diverse backgrounds, find it necessary to provide opportunities to make the students to learn life beyond contours of syllabus so that students can gain transferable resources and skills. The Practice Students themselves engage in cleaning campus and removing waste from the campus. The students prepared cardboard pen boxes and installed at staff room and class rooms, office rooms and other college premises. Now the campus community have a regular practice of disposing pens to the pen boxes and the amount of litter was considerably reduced. Numerous blood donation groups that donate blood to the General Hospital, Government Medical College, Ernakulam and private hospitals function among the students under the leadership of College Union and various student organisations. Moreover many student organisations conduct blood donation camps in the college. Food packets are collected and distributed at the General Hospital, Ernakulam once a week by various student organizations through programmes such as Patheyam (Way Ahead), Pothichoru (Food from Home), which instil the priceless values of sharing and caring among the students. Students popularised the use of LED bulbs within the campus and local community. A survey was conducted in nearby village and they replaced incandescent bulbs by LED bulbs and declared that village as Filament Free Village. They popularised use of organic products and sustainable practices in the campus and campus. The proportion of differently abled students in the campus is 1:50. The campus community assists every differently abled student with utmost care and pleasure. The scribe club in the college helps the differently-abled students in accessing notes and materials and writing exams. The college has set up ramps, toilets with support features, digital library for them. Assistive laptops and software, e-books and e-journals are provided to them Evidence of success 1. The involvement in diverse activities help themselves to develop their knowledge and dexterity in different contexts. These initiatives help to sensitise them about how people around the campus live and how they perceive the college. 2. The college could create a congenial environment for accommodating differently abled students in academics, arts and student politics. 3. Gender specific studies are included in the curriculum of social sciences and humanities. 4. The campus inculcates the spirit of volunteering that makes them to stand with freedom to express for the cause of justice and integrity. 5. The alumni of the college occupies significant posts in all the social, cultural and political spheres.

7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

The Lungs of the City In the heart of the city, the college is greatly blessed with the splendour of green lush embracing the bliss of nature. This educational institution with a history of nearing 150 years is accorded as the Lungs of the City. It hosts a plethora of environment related activities for preserving its natural resources. The distinctive feature of this greenery is that it is managed scientifically with updated records. The Department of Botany maintains very old Botanical Garden and it preserves and displays a wide range of plants labelled with their botanical names. Along with the Department of Botany, student functionaries such as NSS, NCC, Union, Nature Club, Science

Forum etc. engage in activities reducing risk to the environment. NSS and NCC wings clean the campus and its surroundings in alternative weeks and these functionaries relentlessly work for the cause of environment protection. The Department of Botany maintains a Biodiversity Register and updates the records of new plants. Environmental chemistry, environmental economics and sustainable development are included in curriculum. The college during 2019-20 was recognised as the best NSS unit and won the award for the best NSS programme officer by the Mahatma Gandhi University for its eco-friendly activities. The college was awarded Paristhikam, one year project on air pollution, sponsored by the Government of Kerala during this period. Various departments offered workshops on environmental management and sustainable development to faculties and research scholars. The college has taken up rain water harvesting a as mission to store water and to withstand water scarcity in the future. The food waste is composted and converted to biogas for cooking in the college canteen. For long years, there has been practicing the system of segregating the waste into degradable and non-degradable waste and compost the degradable waste into the campus itself. Wick irrigation technology in vegetable cultivation was executed in the campus. It is only necessary to fill once in 10 days and this technology is very useful in educational institutions. The student functionaries such as National Service Scheme, NCC, Nature Club, etc. engage in preserving natural resources and conserving energy sources within the campus and the community.
